TEN BODIES RECOVERED FROM LAKE CONSTANCE.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, June 24.—Ten bodies of fishermen were recovered this morning from Lake Constance and at least 25 more are missing, believed to have been drowned in a sudden terrific storm which occurred over this region yesterday. The storm broke so quickly that the fishermen were unable to reach land only a mile or so away. Many were rescued by lake steamers and other craft after their light boats had capsized.

THAT BROKEN PLEDGE

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has given an interview to the press justifying the action of the Senate in rejecting the address to the Imperial Parliament praying for the Amendment of the British North America Act.

Upon Sir Robert Borden's attention being directed to the interview he said: "I have no desire to engage in newspaper controversy, as the incident can be more effectively discussed at another time and in another manner. Sir Wilfrid's statement compels me, however, to say that his attempted explanation lacks the hall mark of accuracy and that there was in my judgment, a plain violation of an equally plain agreement."

Those who followed the press reports showing the progress of the Redistribution Committee and the presentation of their report to parliament will remember that about two weeks before prorogation it appeared as if no agreement could be reached and it was expected that the bill must be postponed to another session. Eventually a unanimous agreement was reached respecting 233 of the 234 constituencies and it was agreed that the difference with respect to the remaining constituency should be discussed and settled in the House of Commons. This agreement was scrupulously observed by the government.

Those four bills providing for increased representation in the Senate for Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia reached their second reading when it was discovered that the representation of British Columbia could, only be increased by the Imperial Parliament. Accordingly it was arranged that these bills should be dropped and that the increased representation should be effected by imperial legislation passed upon an address of the House of Commons and the Senate. In this connection Sir Robert Borden says:

"The terms of the proposed address were submitted to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and approved by him. From first to last he never suggested any such amendment as that upon which the Senate insisted. When the Redistribution Committee had encountered difficulties and when it seemed probable that the bill must stand over until another session, we were told in the most distinct terms that if a satisfactory arrangement was arrived at respecting redistribution the address for increased senate representation would be agreed to, but that otherwise it would be opposed. There was no thought or suggestion of any amendment in the address, the terms of which were drafted, submitted to Sir Wilfrid and agreed to by him.

In the interview given by Sir Wilfrid, justifying the action of the Senate, he said "The law makes it compulsory to have redistribution after every census but it does not say that it should go into effect at once."

Sir Robert Borden, commenting on this says:

"The address to which Sir Wilfrid agreed for increased representation in the senate contained no limitation as to time and during the negotiations none was ever mentioned or intended, as he well knows. He also knows perfectly well that where there is no limitation, as to time an enactment takes effect immediately. He apparently considers that his agreement would have been honorably carried

out by having his friends in the Senate attach a provision that the proposed enactment should not go into effect for ten years. Such a contention carries its own refutation.

The whole matter can be summed up in a few words. There was a distinct agreement as to redistribution and as to increased representation in the senate. The liberal leaders, after taking every possible advantage which they could obtain under the agreement have first sanctioned and then upheld its deliberate violation.

It was the violation of this agreement on the part of Sir Wilfrid and his henchmen in the Senate that cost Prince Edward Island its fourth representative in the Commons.

CANADA'S TRADE

According to a preliminary statement of the trade of Canada with the outside world, given in the current weekly report of the Department of Trade and Commerce, the imports to Canada in 1914 were \$633,564,000 as compared with \$675,428,000 in 1913. The exports for the past year were \$478,997,000 as compared with \$393,233,000.

It will be observed that there was a considerable decrease in the imports. One of the effects of this decrease was a decline in the customs revenue from \$115,039,000 to \$107,144,000, a drop of nearly eight millions. This was no doubt a result of the financial stringency which prevailed over the world last year, although felt less in Canada than elsewhere.

An encouraging feature, however, is the activity shown in the export trade, which although much greater than the previous year, still fell short of the imports. The exports for 1914, included \$23,560,000 of goods not the produce of Canada, chiefly merchandise passing through to foreign countries, also an equal amount of coin and bullion.

Of the produce of Canada the exports for 1914 exceeded those of 1913 in every line except forest products which fell short nearly four millions. The fisheries exceeded those of 1913 by over three and a quarter millions, while animal and agricultural products were greater by \$56,640,000. There were also increases in the exports of minerals and manufactures.

The theory may be a plausible one but most of us will probably console ourselves for the disappearance of the articles mentioned with the thought that we would not need them much longer

THE ONTARIO CAMPAIGN

The Montreal Gazette says: "The Ontario political campaign has entered on its last week without giving signs that the people are deeply stirred. The record of the Government is figuring only in a minor way in the discussions; and this may be due as much to the weakness of the Opposition as to the strength of the ministers. The position of Mr. Rowell, the Opposition leader, in advocating the abolition of the bar while shops will be free to sell liquor is not as logical as it might be; and the fact has been freely pointed out by his opponents. Some who do not usually figure in political contests have been won to his platform; but evidences have been given that many Liberals doubt the wisdom of any policy touching the licensed victuallers' trade other than that which the province has pursued for years past, and which, while it may not have greatly or at all reduced the actual consumption of alcoholic beverages, has greatly reduced the number of places in which they are sold by retail. It is within the possibilities that the "bar" plank will have only a minor influence on the mass of the voters.

Umberto, the Italian crown prince who is only ten years of age, was so horrified at the bloody sight he saw when taken to a bullfight at Palma, in Spain, that he fainted. The news is not to his detriment. The sight of animals being tortured to death is enough to turn the stomach of even an adult.

The Irish Nationalists are busily engaged in gun-running, the weapons being wanted for use in case of civil war in Ireland. It took the home rulers some time to follow the example set by the men of Ulster, but they seem to be making up for lost time. If the unpleasant business keeps up every Irishman will soon have a gun hidden away for emergencies.

IMPORTED FOXES AND THEIR VALUE

(BY WYLLIE REYNARD)

The low prices that imported silver black and patch foxes are now being offered at is a great temptation to the man of small means who heretofore through range of prices for island foxes has been kept out of the business and had to watch his more favored neighbor grow rich through the almost common medium. Now finding the price of foxes within the scope of his pocket book the small-means man proceeds to buy without very much thought as to the returns or when he may expect any. Two years ago I began to study the record of the returns, more especially as to litters, and the results of my study leads me to believe that the men investing in imported foxes, more especially Western and Ontario, will meet with much disappointment in the coming year and perhaps two years a disappointment now partaken of by purchasers of imported foxes last year and the year before.

The continuation of Prince Edward Island to dominate the fox business depends upon several things, not the least being the courage of the Islanders to continue to embark in the enterprise, but at prospective ranchmen and promoters do not guard against the folly of buying in another zone, they will some day realize the extent of their error.

While there are cases of Western and Ontario foxes having litters this year, and some very large, the percentage is so small as to be alarming. To date the figure is under 10 per cent. for one year foxes and under 20 per cent. for two year. This represents a seventy-five pair. Two ranches, one containing two parts and another containing nearly twenty pairs are not figured in, although often the owners refuse to say they have any pups. Numbers of imported foxes are held in small ranches, one to three pairs mostly patches, and the reports say are without pups. But as no authentic figures were to be had I omitted them. In four ranches where Island, Alaskan, Western, Ontario and Newfoundland foxes were ranches, silver blacks and patches, all one year old, the following is the result for this year: Total number of foxes 54 pair. P. E. I. raised—12 pair—8 litters—75 per cent. Western—18 pair—1 litter—5 1/2 per cent. Ontario—15 pair—1 litter—6 2/3 per cent. Newfoundland—5 pair—3 litters—60 per cent. Alaskan—4 pair—no litter—0.

This table would no doubt be changed if figures from a large number of ranches were available but in view of other figures I have on hand, the proportion would not vary much except perhaps to reduce the Island and Newfoundland percentage a trifle. In citing imported foxes as being an uncertain investment I should exempt the Newfoundland as I find this fox breeds almost as well as the native fox in the first year and more readily mates with the Island animal.

I have received information from an authentic source that some of the large fox companies recently formed were buying Western and Ontario foxes but not making any mention of this fact in their prospectuses. If this is the case the duty of the Fox Breeders Association is plain. It means a lack of dividends for one or two years and Prince Edward Island ranch raised foxes will have to bear the blame.

If you want returns the first and second year buy or invest in foxes that are not moved from one zone to another. I have no axe to grind and no foxes for sale. I think Class A the most desirable fox to breed from, but I own in addition to class A, Western, Ontario and Newfoundland foxes, and this article is written in the whole interest of our Island fox industry and to warn my fellow countrymen from getting a wrong start.

DIED FROM GERMS SHE TRIED TO KILL.

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., June 23.—Miss Marion C. Mabie died of diphtheria Sunday in her home, at No. 5 Edgewood Avenue, a victim of the science to which she had dedicated her life. Miss Mabie became infected with the bacteria of diphtheria while pursuing original research in the laboratories of the Polylinic Hospital in New York city.

About three weeks ago Miss Mabie obtained a tube containing many millions of diphtheria bacteria, suspended in gelatine. At once she began an experiment with this culture. Apparently she soon became infected with the germs in this tube because two days later she was stricken. Physicians who were called to her home said she was suffering with a virulent type of diphtheria. Because of the peculiarity of the diphtheria bacteria in the last tube obtained by her in the laboratory it became practically certain that germs from that tube entered her system.

ITALIAN FOUND MURDERED IN STREET.

GUELPH, Ont., June 22.—John Barr, a local Italian, was found on Essex street this morning with his skull crushed in. Friends believe robbery was the motive, as Barr had about \$300 on him on Saturday, and when found his pockets were empty.
