SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties. Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

A BIG FIGHT ON RECIPROCIITY.

There is going to be a great big fight over reciprocity if the famous agreement goes into effect. If the agreement is sanctioned by Congress, or whether it is or not, the Canadian Parliament must pass it. The big fight will be at the polls in Canada, when the next election comes round and that may be during the current year. And the more easily it gets through Congress, whether at the present session or at a special session of the new Congress to be called later, the more widespread and stubborn will be the opposition to it in Canada.

There are many indications of the big fight that is coming. The opposition leaders at the capital have evidently taken on new hopes and new determination from the changed situation caused by the agreement made at Washington. The delegations which have come to Ottawa from time to time in opposition to it have given them new courage. The powerful Manufacturers' Association are working overtime to defeat the agreement. And they have money and brains and widely circulated newspapers at their command to begin and carry on a most energetic campaign to the bitter end.

Wherever there is a board of trade or an association of any kind, industrial or mercantile in which there is a hostile majority, resolutions are adopted and are paraded in the protectionist press under flaming headlines denouncing reciprocity. The best political cartoonists have been set busy. The Toronto Board of Trade in a meeting of over 300 members, business men, traders, wholesalers, transportation men, bankers and professional men, of both political parties only had a minority of thirteen men to support the agreement, so The News of that city

THE COMING SESSION.

Two weeks hence the Legislature will meet, on March 7. His Honor, Lieutenant Governor Rogers, will officiate for the first time in his official capacity at a legislative opening. This and the close division of political parties in the House and the chances of what the session may bring forth will give some special interest to the occasion.

It is probably not of much use to offer advice to either of the party leaders as to the course they shall pursue during the session. Both Premier Haszard and Mr. Matheson should by this time know their business as party leaders. But in the past the opinion of the public has been that too much time has been devoted to party warfare and too little to the necessary business of the country. This year the House meets very late in the season, and it would seem important that the session should be short and devoted strictly to business and the adoption of needed reforms, to the exclusion of wordy party debates or the discussion of irrelevant or merely academic questions.

The letter of W. F. Tidmarsh, in regard to fishing licenses, in last evening's Patriot confirms our citation from the Revised Statutes. Mr. Tidmarsh further affirms that no license has been granted by the Canadian Government to any United States vessel to fish within the territorial waters of Canada since 1888. Is Mr. Tidmarsh fully informed as to when the conditions of the Modus Vivendi were extended? His recital does not cover all the facts of the case.

The Guardian has flourished under the periodical outbreaks of abuse from The Patriot and today has more Liberal readers than our accuser, to say nothing of Conservatives and independents. We would be glad to have The Patriot now reproduce in a single broadside all the harsh things it has said about The Guardian and its editor during the past few years. As it seems "shy" about repeating its eloquent editorial on that "magnificent" electric pole, and as The Guardian is its principal and almost only editorial topic these days, this would seem to be a fitting thing to do.

The Opposition papers of Toronto are parading with great apparent pleasure a protest against the reciprocity agreement signed by nineteen prominent Liberals of that city. The protest is a strongly worded document, and among the signers are Sir Mortimer Clark, late Governor of Ontario, Sir Byron E. Walker, President of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, H. Blain, one of the directors of the Toronto Globe, Z. A. Lash, formerly law partner of Hon. Edward Blake and the others are all men of prominence.

But Toronto is both a Conservative and a protectionist stronghold. But the greatest hope of the Opposition is to link reciprocity with annexation and rouse Canadian loyalty to defeat the trade agreement. We do not doubt that they will fail, but we must bear in mind that manufacturers have grown wealthy and powerful, and will back their campaign with a mint of money. The Conservative party, too, is strong in numbers and resources of various kinds, and there are so many who will vote for their party whether right or wrong. Therefore we apprehend a great big fight when the election comes round.

So far as the newspapers are concerned, the Conservative attack upon reciprocity has been more vigorous and energetic than the Liberal defence. The fact is that a good many Liberal journals are sadly hampered by their past utterances, in which they had declared again and again that the conditions had changed, that the country did not want reciprocity, and some of them had gone so far as to say it would be rejected if offered us by the United States. A large section of the Liberal press had become practically protectionist during the fifteen years past. They find it hard now to get into line and refute their former utterances.

And the public mind indoctrinated as it has been, is a little confused by having reciprocity rather suddenly sprung upon the country as a tangible reality. But things will speedily right themselves we trust, in view of the undoubted attractions which reciprocity holds forth. Still the coming political campaign promises to be a stirring one in which there will be enough of uncertainty of chances to create profound interest.

HOME RULE FOR IRELAND.

Mr. Asquith's recent statement in the House of Commons sets at rest all doubt as to the policy of his Government in regard to Home Rule for Ireland. He clearly stated that the policy of the Government is to create an Irish Parliament, with an Irish executive responsible thereto for dealing with purely Irish affairs, while maintaining the supremacy of the Imperial Parliament unimpaired.

If there has been any change of front it is on the part of the Irish Nationalists themselves who have evidently dropped once and for all the demand for complete, or practically complete independence. In this they were wise, their original demands being such as could never have been conceded. There is good reason to believe that the Irish leaders are now quite in accord with the Liberal leader on this great question.

We have long believed that a settlement on a fair basis of the long-standing grievances of Ireland is a matter of the first importance to the United Kingdom and to the Empire at large. And we know of no better plan than that which Mr. Asquith has set forth, which is practically to give to Ireland such legislative power over her own local affairs as is enjoyed by the several Canadian Provinces within the Dominion. It has worked well in Canada and should have good results in the Mother Country.

DIRIGIBLE BALLOONING

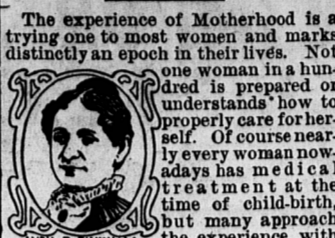
