"You think so? Have some tea," said his youthful aunt and shot him a smile that was more sly than demure.

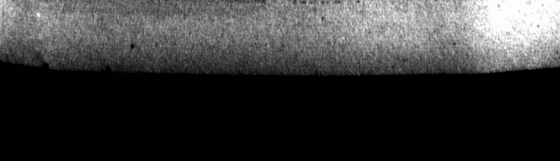

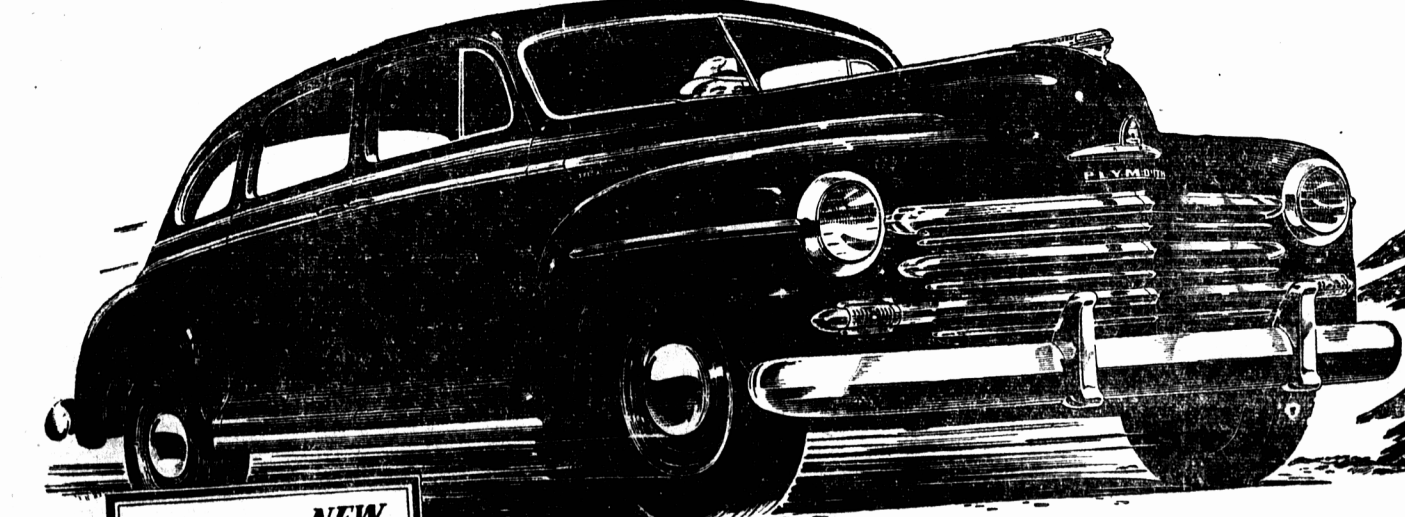

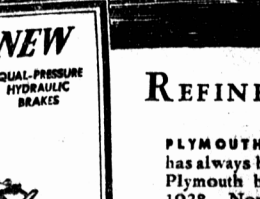
