

Vics And Saints Meet Tonight At The Forum

Tonight's meeting in Island Intermediate Hockey League play, scheduled to get underway at the Forum at eight o'clock, will bring together for the second time this season the Charlottetown Victorias and the Saint Dunstan's University pucksters.

The last time the two teams met, the Saints sent the Vics down to a 7-4 defeat, but it might be a different story tonight. Since neither last the Vics have moved up into second place in the league standing, and are at present a full point behind the Saints who are holding down third place.

But whether or not this is any indication that the Vics are a stronger team than they were earlier in the season, and can come out on top with a win tonight, remains of course to be seen. The Saints have had a number of hot games, but they seem to be in a much improved state as their opponents.

In any event, the game should come up with a keen battle all the way and is likely to be decided conclusively until the final bell rings.

AYR, Scotland, Jan. 23—(CP)—Canadian curlers today lost the third test match for the Strathcona Cup by 27 shots. The Canadians now are 66 shots behind the cup-holding Scots in the five-match series.

Victorias Down Miners 8-4

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 23—(CP)—North Sydney Victorias whipped in seven goals in the last two periods to bludgeon Glace Bay Miners 8-4 here tonight and climb within two points of league-leading Sydney Millers in the tight Cape Breton Senior Hockey League race.

The loss prevented Miners from taking over the runner-up spot from Vics and dropped Glace Bay five points off the pace. Millers are in front with 59 points as at home to Vics tomorrow night.

Wide Open Race At Big Quebec 'Spiel

QUEBEC, Jan. 23—(CP)—The race in two opening events of Quebec's 27th International Bouspiel appeared wide open tonight with rinks from many parts of Canada and the United States taking first-round victories.

A total of 120 rinks is divided between the two events—the Chateau International and the Val d'Or Golden Valley. Losers in the first round become eligible for the grand aggregate competition and for other awards.

Most decisive victory today was hung up by W. G. McGerrigle of Ormstown, Que., who trounced W. T. Powers of Lunenburg, N.S., 2-4.

Following this victory McGerrigle was considered a heavy favorite.

United States winners included George L. Erwin of Chicago and Thomas Allen of Brookline, Mass. Losers were A. Popenfuss of Wausau, Wis., and Paul S. Granv of Milwaukee, Wis.

Birch Hills, Sask., western Canada's only rink entered in the 'spiel, got off to a good start when skip Dr. G. M. Beall defeated J. K. Hackett of Quebec.

LONDON, Jan. 23—(AP)—Britain's Freddie Mills makes the first defence of the lightweight championship he won 18 months ago, against Joey Maxim, clever Cleveland boxer, in Earl's Court tomorrow night.

A capacity crowd of 18,000 already is assured for the 15-round battle. Bookmakers here have established the 27-year-old Maxim as a 1-to-2 favorite.

One reason for Maxim's favoritism is that he has been working at his trade while the 30-year-old titleholder has had only two bouts since he won the crown from Gus Lesnevich of Cliffside Park, N.J. in London, July 26, 1948.
