THE City of London pines on East River today.

THE City of London had 30 cases of eggs, 24 cases lobsters and 25 passengers from West River yesterday morning. In the afternoon she took forty passengers out, 15 of whom were excursionists, and brought in 40 cases eggs.

E. McGLASHING, Bayfield, N. B., Wm. Morgan and Wm. Carroll, Halifax, the crew of the schooner Glenora wrecked at Rustico came to the city last night and leave this morning for their homes. The vessel was almost a complete wreck and has been sold to Rustico parties including B. W. Lepage, Joe. Gallant and Messrs Paynter and Publicover.

THE annual meeting of Branch No. 47, Order of Railway Telegraphers, was held at the Railway last night with a good attendance. After routine business the members presented Chief Telegrapher Montgomery, Alberton, with a handsome gold-headed cane in appreciation of his services as their delegate to Ottawa. Mrs Montgomery was also remembered with a beautiful marble clock.

Mrs Annie Bernice McMurdo, youngest daughter of John and Mrs McMurdo of Alberton, P. E. I., died at Boston, May 21st. Deceased contracted pneumonia on the steamer enroute to Boston and on her arrival was conveyed to a private hospital. She was 30 years of age and intended entering the work of the Young Women's Christian Association. The remains were taken to Alberton for interment and were accompanied part of the way by the brother of the deceased, L. B. McMurdo, of Newcastle, N. B. Miss McMurdo was a general favorite with the young people of Alberton.

The same committee will consider while in Ottawa the selection of a successor to Prof. E. J. McMillan who goes to South Africa. Judge Warburton, city and J. K. Brace, Summerside have been appointed on the Charlottetown and Summerside School Boards, the former vice D. C. McLeod, resigned. An application of Walter Lowe to sue the Government has been refused and an application for a new school at Pembroke with third class teacher granted.

W. A. WINFIELD, the popular manager of the P. E. I. Telephone Co., leaves tomorrow morning for Stellarton, N. S., where his marriage takes place next Wednesday to Miss May Cameron, of that town. Of this happy event, the Hants Journal says: "Wilfred A. Winfield, assistant at the N.S. Telephone Company's office here for two years, is among those put down on the list of June grooms. The bride to be is Miss May, daughter of Wm. Cameron, owner of the brickyard at Stellarton. Invitations are now out for the wedding at six o'clock in the evening, at the home of the bride's parents, Wednesday, June 23rd. The bride will be attended by her friend, Miss Sadie Macintosh, of Stellarton; the groomsmen will be Dr. Ross, Canso. Rev. Dr. Tufts, of Sharon Presbyterian Church will officiate. Mr. Winfield is a son of the Rev. Mr. Winfield, for many years doing missionary work in connection with St. Paul's Parish, Halifax, and who is now stationed at Kensington, P. E. Island. 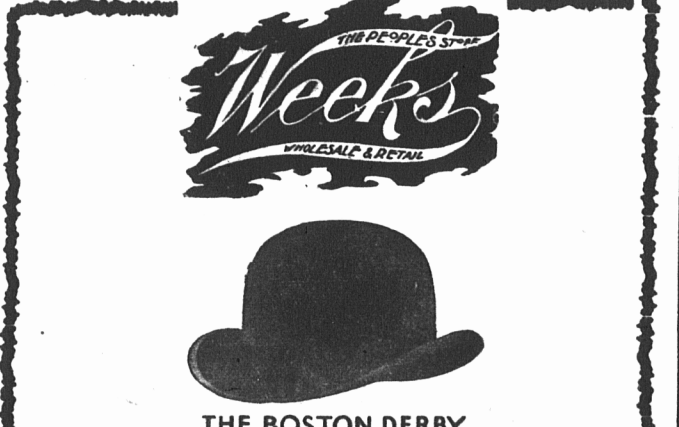

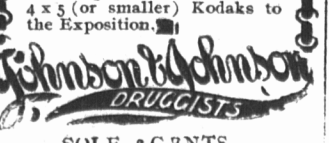
