THE Empires defeated Queen Square School at Hillsboro rink Saturday morning 4 to 3.

THERE was crossing both ways at the Cape Saturday. The trips were made in good time.

JAMES ROONEY, drunk and disorderly on Lower Great George Street was arrested yesterday forenoon about half past ten.

THE congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Pictou has decided to extend a call to Rev. L. H. McLean, of Strathmore, C. B., who has been supplying the pulpit for some weeks. Rev. Mr. McLean presided in Zion Church a short time ago.

THE P. E. Islander who was mentioned in our last issue as having been fined for selling contraband cigarettes is also out the sum of \$50 and costs, and a stock of liquor, which he had on hand. The liquor was seized and destroyed as a result of a conviction obtained by Prosecutor Jones. —Pictou Advocate.

THE funeral of the late William T. Down took place yesterday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from his late residence on Fitzroy Street, to People's Cemetery and was largely attended. The pallbearers were Joseph Warren, W. W. Harper, R. B. Small, John Pastmore, Archibald McDougall and H. C. Lowe.

THE British Channel cruiser Squadron, which has been among the West India Islands all winter arrived at Bermuda Wednesday. The fleet consists of the flagship Good Hope, 14,000 tons, 900 men, carrying the flag of Rear Admiral Sir W. H. Fawkes, the first class cruiser Drake 14,000 tons, 900 men, the first class cruiser Kent, 9,800 tons, 750 men; the first class cruiser Donegal, 9,800 tons, 750 men and the first class cruiser Berwick, 9,800 tons, 750 men. There is a possibility of the fleet coming to Halifax before returning to England. —Halifax Chronicle.

THE St. John Telegraph of Friday says: Yesterday morning argument in the McKinnon case was resumed and at the conclusion the prisoner was sent up for trial. Mr. Lawlor and Mr. Mott were recalled and cross-examined. The only thing brought out was that some of the goods had been shipped through St. John to Charlottetown, which fact it was held gave the magistrate here jurisdiction in the matter. After hearing the arguments his honor said that although the evidence did not furnish any strong presumption of guilt there was some evidence and he would have to send him up, although he remarked he never before sent a man up on such slight evidence, nor had he ever a case in which so many difficult questions came up. SPECIAL references were made in most of the city churches yesterday to the centenary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which is to be observed today.

THE tenders for the new wing to the Queen Hotel have been let by the proprietress, Mrs. Archibald to W. W. Harper. The new wing will occupy the whole of the vacant lot to the east of the hotel. It will be the same height as the main building and beside giving a new office, verandah, and gentlemen's entrance will have twenty additional bedrooms.

A CORRESPONDENT from Orwell writes on 6th inst. that a lecture was given last Monday evening with an excellent lecture by Rev. R. G. Sinclair of Montague on "Experiences in the North West on the trail and in the mission field." The learned lecturer in choice language portrayed the difficulties of travel by backboard and jumper over prairie and scrub, through sloughs and shallows, by winding rivers, through rushing fords and across illimitable plains—in the summer midst swarms of mosquitoes and other flies of various names but equal ferocity and persistence and in the winter midst the flying drift with the temperature, at times, 50 degrees below zero. The lecture was interspersed with anecdotes illustrative of the 1.50 years of the various types of the western pioneer and of some so distinctively un-que as to make classification impossible. The missionary life with its light and shadow was attractively described and at the close a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer to which he suitably responded. I take the opportunity afforded by your widely read paper of commending Mr. Sinclair's services to any society, guild or institute anxious to augment its revenue by means that will prove both entertaining and instructive. Mr. W. H. Musick, the popular and efficient teacher of our public school, leaves shortly for the Northwest.—The death occurred on Tuesday morning of Malcolm McLeod, Woodside from pneumonia, after a few days illness. The deceased was in his seventy-seventh year and universally respected. He leaves a widow, one son and two daughters, who have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

A MEETING of the subscribers and others interested in the new hotel was held Saturday afternoon in the Council Chamber. The chairman, Dr. Warburton reported that upwards of \$30000 had been promised and there remained but \$15000 to be secured. The question of raising the remainder was informally discussed. Horace Hazard deplored the lack of interest being shown. He had received a letter from Mr. Chipman, manager of the Plant Line, intimating that besides cutting off the second Plant line the boat it might be necessary to make the terminus at Summerside the coming season instead of at this port. There were no better accommodations provided. Mayor Kelly in speaking of the closing of the Davies referred to a letter which had been sent him as Mayor of Charlottetown by P. Doherty. The writer said that it was impossible to conduct a hotel without a bar and he would not return to Charlottetown as long as he would soon find himself in jail. He could not see the Davies Hotel as no responsible persons would take it under present conditions. George E. Hughes thought the tourist trade would receive a great set-back this summer. Something should be done to provide accommodation for the coming summer. He suggested that the Plant Line and Steam Navigation Co., unite to temporarily open the Davies and place a manager in charge. He also pointed out that the City might take stock in the new hotel to the extent of \$10,000 or \$15,000. After further discussion the following members were added to the committee to make a further effort: Mayor Kelly, Col. Moore, D. O. M. Reddin, Donald Nicholson and Simon W. Crabbe.
