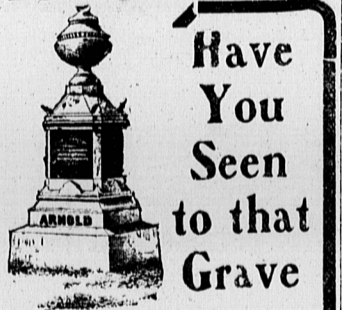

Yesterday numbers of citizens, prompted by curiosity and exhibiting no little interest, were observed from time to time gathered around the drinking fountain in Queen Square. The object of interest was the fountain itself, for it has outgrown that period, but they were carefully inspecting the new attachment for drinking, which has recently been placed there. This attachment is one of the most up-to-date appliances in its line yet seen and from a sanitary standpoint is certainly to be commended. It is composed of a circular rim, nicely nickelled, attached by framework to a jet, the source of water supply for the thirsty,—and this rim has to be pressed lightly in order to turn on the water and when this is done a generous supply of the liquid gurgles up with just enough force to bring the water into one's mouth when the face is applied to the patent rim. By this method one is not compelled to use a public drinking cup; not even the hands being necessary to turn on the water.
