While putting the whole unworn facts before their shareholders, as the directors deem it their duty, they now warn shareholders against getting panic-stricken and selling their shares without consideration. Their plan is intact and should give a splendid return next year. Misfortunes of this kind do not often occur and the directors urge upon the shareholders not to sacrifice their shares, which today are worth full par value, when speculators ask them to sell.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was favoured with fine weather, in marked but pleasant contrast with the day before.

The highest temperature registered yesterday was 36 degrees above zero, whereas on the previous night the lowest had been 30 degrees above. At 9 a.m. yesterday it was 34 degrees above zero; at 9 p. m., 28 degrees above.

The tide will be high this morning at 10.33 tomorrow at 11.07 and Monday at 12.10; it will be high tonight at 12.22; tomorrow at 12 and Tuesday at 12.51.

The sun sets this evening at 7.01, tomorrow at 7.02 and Monday at 7.03; it rises tomorrow morning at 4.54, Monday at 4.52 and Tuesday at 4.50.

The moon sets tonight at 7.46 and tomorrow at 8.53.

The last quarter of the moon was on Friday, April 17 at 3.52 a. m.

There will be a new moon on Saturday, April 25th at 7.23 a. m.

The length of today will be fourteen hours and six minutes and of tomorrow fourteen hours and eight minutes.

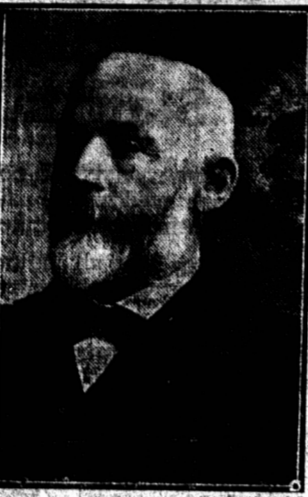

THE CANADIAN "MOVIE"

American Surprised at the Lack of British Scenes

An American visitor to Canada has made it his business to visit the moving picture shows in both the east and the west, and he has recorded his observations in a letter which appeared in the New York Times: "The moving pictures shown in Canadian cities, with few exceptions, are of American manufacture and depict scenes in the United States. Across the screen march our soldiers and over them waves the Stars and Stripes. It is that flag that flutters over many buildings and waves over many a battlefield. When, almost without exception, the hero dies for his flag it is the Red, White and Blue. And it is the men of Uncle Sam who arrive at the frontier post in time to save the hero and the heroine."

The events and scenes thus depicted are accorded varying receptions in different localities. "In Eastern Canada, I have seen such films received in silence or with audible expressions of disfavor. Not always in the disapproval of a sign of ill-feeling. Once in Winnipeg when scene after scene from San Francisco to New York appeared, a man next to me turned to his companion. "Why don't they give us pictures of what is going on in England?" Now, that man was simply homesick. He had watched picture after picture and there was nothing of the happenings at home. In this respect the feeling that moves an Englishman is the same that would move a Swede lumber jack up in Michigan. Both simply want home scenes."

MARVELOUS BATTER WAS WEE WILLIE

Now He Only Has to Watch His Bank Account Not His Batting Average

Will baseball ever see another Willie Keeler?

"We Willie," the batting marvel of the game; one of the few to get into the 400 class and the only batter that ever played an entire season without fanning is now a real estate broker and apartment house owner in Brooklyn, and his heaviest work is collecting his rents and banking the money. Keeler vies with Fielder Jones, Cy Young and Bill Larn as the richest retired ball player. Any of the four can write his check for more than \$100,000—and have it honored, too.

Willie Keeler was one of that wonderful Baltimore outfit of 1904, '05 and '06, with Walter Brodie and Kelly. Brilliant fielders, hard hitters and great base runners were they, and

Keeler was the mightiest of the trio. His last appearance in the big league was with the Giants, in 1910, as emergency hitter.

Keeler played 20 years, starting with Birmingham in the Eastern league, in 1892, and winding up with Toronto in 1911.

Keeler holds the world's record for the greatest number of hits in a season. In 1897, he accumulated 442 singles for an average of .442. He was the most scientific batter that ever played ball. He invented "choking the bat. Small and light, he realized



he could do more effective hitting by merely tapping the ball "where the soft" than by swinging his head off in an effort for long hits. Always crowding the plate, Keeler grasped his bat near the middle and hit to any field at will; the fielders never knew where to play for him. Right or left-handed pitches looked alike, and no matter how they pitched to him, "Wee Willie" placed the ball where he wanted to.

UNEMPLOYMENT MUST BE FACED

Mr. J. E. Atkinson Would Draw Lessons From the Old World

"The Problem of Unemployment" was the title of an interesting address given by Mr. J. E. Atkinson, Toronto. "We have been accustomed to say that in Canada we have not the problems of unemployment and a demand for a rearrangement of industry as they have them in other and in older countries," said Mr. Atkinson, "hence our legislators have paid practically no attention to them. From this comfortable state of mind the people of this city, at least, must have been disturbed during the present winter. Many thousands have found themselves lacking employment through no fault of theirs. Their families have suffered, in many cases to the utmost extremity. These workers receive wages that, even in times of work, are so close to the margin of sustenance that it is a mockery to ask why they do not save enough to tide them over those periods of non-employment which are as certain and almost as regular as the ebb of the tides. Ontario has not unemployment in the same degree as England, but the large and apparently inevitable degree to which the Province is affected urgently demands some such provision being made by legislation as is already in operation in the motherland."
