PROF. ROSS addressed the meeting of the Teachers' Federation last evening on the Science of the Laws of Mind. The first fact the teacher must take notice of is that there is always some consciousness going on and that this field is always complex. The pupil must be regarded as a mass of possibilities of reaction and the purpose of education is to make these reactions numerous and perfect. The teachers' task is the supervising of the acquiring of these reactions. This acquiring process is governed by two laws, and a knowledge of the native instincts of children is almost invaluable to the teacher. The instincts of Fear, Love, and Emulation are of great importance and the two latter should be made much use of. After some remarks on the value of Emulation by Mr. Campbell and some criticism of the narrow view of Behaviour taken by Mr. Ross the meeting adjourned till Monday April 9th.

The stenographer, jurymen, sheriff, constable, etc. took their parts well. The addresses were of a high order and reflected great credit on those taking part. While it was the first attempt of the students in so heavy a role, the manner in which it was produced goes to show that they will be heard from again in the near future.
