

Experience of South African Campaign That The Old Methods Should be Forgotten.

London, Dec. 9.—"Military surgery must be rewritten in face of the new facts discovered by means of the X-ray's says Dr. John Hall Edwards, surgeon radiographer of the Imperial Yeomanry Hospital in South Africa. Dr. Edwards, who was in charge of the Roentgen apparatus during the campaign, made hundreds of examinations of wounded with many marvellous results. He is convinced that the South African war has demonstrated the necessity of adding to the Army Medical Corps a properly constituted X-rays departments and of training its members to use the apparatus with readiness in case of emergencies He said:

Time-worn, useless and dangerous methods for the location of hidden bullets can be forgotten, the X-ray furnishing an aseptically scientific and absolutely accurate method. The altered conditions of warfare have necessitated considerable alterations in surgical methods. The high velocity of the new firearms leaves fewer bullets in the tissues, for these few are usually so far from the entrance of the wound that no probe is capable of reaching them, and apart from the X-rays there is no method of finding them. "It is now possible to examine the whole body in a few minutes, and to find a bullet, no matter where situated, without inconvenience or risk to the patient. Actual experience has taught that, although upon the battlefield the X-rays is superior to the old methods of diagnosis, there is little necessity for the use of the apparatus in such an advanced position. The whole of my work in South Africa was done in hospitals. If the work is to be well done it must be done under favorable conditions. Localization requires exactitude. It cannot be properly performed under rough and tumble circumstances." Dr. Edwards added that Mauser and Lee-Enfield bullets from a humanitarian point of view are superior to the old Martini-Henry and other bullets. There are far fewer injuries to bones and a remarkable decrease in the number of deaths from gunshot wounds compared with former campaigns. This is due to the new weapons as well as to advanced surgical knowledge.

It is not necessary that the Stanley should lie here idle waiting until the Northumberland is unable to effect a crossing between Summerside and Point du Chene. Why not fix a certain day on which to begin work on the Summerside-Tormentine route, and on the previous day have an order sent that the mails be transferred so that no hitch might occur in communication. Let us suppose that the Northumberland while in the service falls on account of ice to reach Point du Chene; before the fact is known it would probably be too late to transfer mails on the same day. In this case there would naturally be a day's mail behind and perhaps more. The safest plan then is to make sure that no break will occur, and let it be understood at Paines Junction and other points on the Mainland that after a given date freight, passengers and mail shall go via Sackville and Cape Tormentine. Year after year there has been delays in the traffic because of no system. Even on the first day of the opening of the new route the Northumberland could make her last trip in order if for nothing else, to clean up what freight and take what passengers might be in waiting at Point du Chene. Let us have assistance about these matters and one which will be understood both in this Province and on the other side of the straits.
