## HAUPTMANN DENIES KIDNAP-MURDER CHARGE

### FEAR FOR SAFETY OF 1200 MINERS Climaxes Habeas Corpus Hearing

#### Vessel Bears Scars Of Old Time Brawl

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)  
LIVERPOOL, N. S., Oct. 15.—His vessel still showing scars of a real old-time brawl, Captain Ivan Carlsson sailed the Boston Traver Dartmouth out of port today and headed for home.  
The crew became involved in a fight with several local negroes Saturday night, and a barrage of flying stones from above broke windows on the boat and left at least one member of the crew injured and several others with minor cuts and bruises.  
With 185,000 pounds of fresh fish in her hold, the Dartmouth put into Liverpool for ice on Saturday. She carries 16 men.  
Houlton Warrington and Clayton Jarvis, both of Liverpool were arrested today and will be arraigned tomorrow on charges in connection with the fight.

#### POINCARÉ LAST OF FRENCH WAR GREAT DIES

War-time President Will Be Honoured By Nation He Served With Passionate Patriotism.

PARIS, Oct. 15.—The body of Raymond Poincaré, who served the France he loved with passionate patriotism as war-time President, will be buried Saturday in the little family cemetery at Nubecourt near Bar-le-Duc.  
Poincaré, broken by long illness, died early today at the age of 74. His labors for his country had taxed too greatly, he himself said, his physical resistance.  
Like Poincaré, the little cemetery where he will be buried, while the notables of France and the world pay him honor, suffered in the war. Its tombstones still bear the scars of fragments of German shells.



#### Hitler Turns Down Request For Leniency

MUNICH, Germany, Oct. 15.—Reichsleiter Adolf Hitler has refused a request by General Franz Von Epp, Governor of Bavaria, that Nazi Church authorities adopt more lenient tactics in their turbulent conflict with Bavarian Church authorities, reports said today.  
Simultaneously, reports from Gutzendorf, upper Bavaria, said 600 peasants armed with sticks and stones gathered sullenly in front of the Mayor's office to protest a Nazi decree forbidding Dr. Hans Meiser, deposed Protestant Bishop of Bavaria, to preach in that region. The peasants' menacing attitudes caused the authorities to suspend the ban.  
Bishop Meiser and other members of the Bavarian Protestant Church continued under close police supervision here.  
It was said Bavarian police did not take part in the Nazi Church authorities' moves during the last few days in Bavaria, but that Nazi special guards under Federal direction enforced the Reich Church's orders.

#### 3RD TERRORIST SUSPECT IS APPREHENDED

Sylvester Chalny Admits Part in Assassinations—Two Others Still Sought.

PARIS, Oct. 15.—Sylvester Chalny, third terrorist suspect to be apprehended, tonight admitted complicity in the plot to assassinate King Alexander, police announced.  
The questioning of Chalny, who used numerous other names, was said to be proceeding satisfactorily but slowly. He was being questioned through a group of interpreters headed by officials of the Yugoslavian legation.  
The details of Chalny's admissions were not disclosed.  
Chalny had hidden for five days and nights in Fontainebleau forest, Hungary and suffering from thirst, he emerged from the woods today at Melun. He was seized promptly and questioned concerning his connection with Petrus Kalemen, the assassin of Marseille.

#### GOV'T. AND COMPANY REACH ACCORD

Mental and Physical Condition of Men Entombed Five Days May Make Parley Impossible.

PECS, Hungary, Oct. 16.—(Tuesday)—Owners of the coal mine here where nearly 1,200 miners are attempting mass suicide early today reached an agreement with the government to grant the miners' demand of wage increases.  
They were goaded into action by public opinion aroused over the plight of the miners who had banded together to die by suffocation rather than continue trying to support themselves on wages of less than \$2 a week.  
The owners agreed to eliminate a wage cut, to raise the working time from two to three days per week, and to pay a bonus of \$3.00 per head to help tide over the winter.

#### Trans-Ocean Flier Injured

LYMPNE, Kent, England, Oct. 15.—(C. P. Cable)—James Ayling, trans-Atlantic flier, received severe cuts about the head today when a London and Scottish provincial airways plane he was piloting collided with a truck as he was landing at Lympne airport. No passengers were on board.  
Ayling's plane was wrecked and so was the truck. The flier who hopped the Atlantic from Wassaga Beach, Ont., to London last August with Leonard Reid of Montreal, received treatment for his injuries and then hired an automobile to complete his journey to Heston, near London.  
Bad weather caused the accident. Ayling was flying from Portsmouth to Heston but weather conditions forced him down at Lympne. A thick haze made visibility poor and as the machine taxied across the field it hit a truck loaded with floodlight apparatus.  
Ayling joined the London and Scottish provincial airways after his successful trans-Atlantic flight in "the Trail of the Caribou." Originally Reid and Ayling had planned to set a long distance flight record by hopping to Baghdad but diminishing gasoline supply forced them down at Heston aerodrome.

#### Faces Second Murder Trial

HALIFAX, Oct. 15.—Facing his second trial on a charge of stabbing 12-year-old Bramwell Hoffer-nan to death, Daniel P. Sampson chewed idly on a match for hours today while his counsel first submitted that the middle-aged negro was mentally incompetent to stand trial and later exhausted the panel of Supreme Court jurymen.  
After Mr. Justice John Doull had decided that the prisoner was competent and a jury had been assembled with the assistance of additional witnesses summoned from the street and business houses by court officials, the trial began.  
Richard Matthews, the first witness, told of finding the boy's body on July 19, 1933, near the railway tracks a few miles from Halifax. The body of a brother, Edward Hoffer-nan, lay nearby.  
Other witnesses described the country in that vicinity and told of having seen the brothers picking berries. The two were on their way home when they died, both from wounds in their backs.

#### Reorganization Of French Cabinet Is Completed

PARIS, Oct. 15.—(C. P. Cable)—Reorganization of the French Cabinet was completed today with the appointment of Senator Henri Lemaire to fill the post of Minister of Justice left vacant by Henri Charon, who resigned under criticism for his conduct of the Stavisky and Prince polio investigations.  
Lemaire, a veteran political figure from Martinique, admittedly faces a delicate task in conducting these inquiries which are complicated by their political background. Three other Senators refused to take the post.

#### 700 REBELS ARE KILLED IN BATTLE

MADRID, Oct. 15.—Loyal troops tonight continued their victorious march into the Asturias mining regions, quenching as they went the last scattered embers of the radical revolt that flamed up 10 days ago.  
Meanwhile other forces began a march over the route of destruction wrought by the rebels in the vicinity of Oviedo, which they yielded to the government troops only after heavy artillery bombardment.  
More than 700 bodies of rebels killed in the Oviedo battle were buried behind the Principe barracks while the bodies of others awaited identification for burial.  
Many valuable properties were destroyed in the bombardment, but strangely the ancient cathedral, which many rebels used as a stronghold until they were driven out by guards, was not harmed.  
Falls at Oviedo were killed with rebel prisoners and an overflow of 200 was placed aboard the cruiser Libertad.

#### Hauptmann Climaxes Habeas Corpus Hearing

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Bruno Richard Hauptmann dramatically denied from the witness stand today the kidnap-killing of the Lindbergh baby as he sought to establish an alibi for the night of the abduction.  
"Did you murder the child, Charles Augustus Lindbergh?" his attorney asked the German carpenter at the climax of a habeas corpus hearing.  
"No," Hauptmann answered quietly.  
Attorney General David A. Wilentz of New Jersey, seeking Hauptmann's extradition to his state on a murder charge, jumped up.  
"Didn't you build a ladder and climb up it into the baby's room, and didn't you murder the baby?" he demanded.  
"No," Hauptmann shouted, raising his voice for the first time and grasping the arms of the witness chair.

Previously he testified before Supreme Court Justice E. N. Hammer in the Bronx that:  
He spent the night before the kidnapping with his wife in their Bronx home; he drove her to her work at a bakery that morning; he looked for work in Manhattan during the day.  
He didn't see his wife at the bakery, had a late dinner there and drove her home, where both spent the night.  
Calm in manner, cautious in speech, Hauptmann was never frustrated once by the vigorous efforts of Attorney General David Wilentz of New Jersey to shake his alibi.  
He explained a criminal record in Germany by saying he stole only "to secure sustenance."  
He readily admitted to Wilentz he lied the day of his arrest, three weeks ago, when he told his captors the \$20 gold ransom certificate found on him was part of his savings.  
In the next breath, his deep-set eyes sparkling, Hauptmann said he just as readily told authorities later in the jail that he had some of the Lindbergh ransom bills at his home. This surprise statement came at the outset of Wilentz' cross-examination at the opening of the afternoon session.  
Previously, his blonde wife, Anna, laid the foundation for the alibi. She testified she worked late every Tuesday night at Christian Frederickson's bakery in the Bronx. She worked late those nights, she said, because Mrs. Frederickson was off duty.  
Inasmuch as the kidnapping was on a Tuesday night, she was sure her husband called for her that night.  
After his wife stepped down from the witness stand, Fawcett motioned for Hauptmann to occupy it. There was a hush for a minute over the crowd. Fawcett's voice was soft.

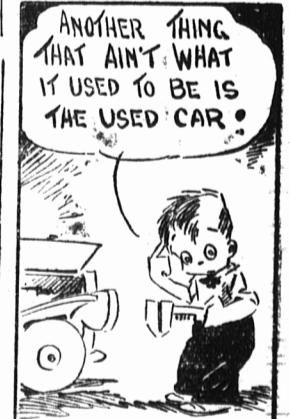
