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McIntyre Evades Question When Challenged To Deny Statement Re Phone Order

McEwen And McDonald, In Fighting Form At Cherry Hill Meeting, Score Opponents For Unauthorized Machinery Purchase And For Irresponsibility And Extravagance With Taxpayers Money. Meeting Warmly Applauds Conservative Candidates.

Emphatic denial of the content of the Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works, that he had made in the Legislature full information of his road machinery purchases when asked to do so by Opposition was made on Saturday night at the Cherry Hill meeting by Mr. J. B. MacDonald, Conservative candidate, who challenged Mr. McIntyre to deny that he had failed to table any correspondence when requested to do so, or that he had ordered the machinery by "phone."

they only machined the roads, which is a different thing entirely," he continued. The road machinery purchased for this work had been condemned in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and it was on the company's hands and no doubt was purchased at a reduced price on that account.

The meeting was the opening one in the Second District of King's. The efforts of the Liberal candidates, Messrs. McIntyre and Cox, to switch the discussion to federal matters exposed to the audience the weakness of their case. Mr. McIntyre's allegation in this connection, that the Bennett Government had imposed a million dollars of extra taxation upon the Province, being flatly contradicted by the audience.

Churchill Writes Sensational Article

BERLIN, June 26—The Boersens Courier this morning prints a sensational article by Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former British chancellor of the Exchequer, in which the post war years up to today are pictured as "merely a continuation of the world war with Germany and France the antagonists and Great Britain and the United States the unwitting financiers of a struggle in which they have no chance to win anything."

"The old system of exploiting the defeated enemy," it continues "was to carry away all the gold and beautiful women and other booty that could be carted away and then to let the ravished land get back to its feet as best it could, which might be in a comparatively few years. The new plan, however, tried after the world war, was to make a perpetual and highly organized cove out of the defeated nation—something that could be milked ad infinitum. Great Britain and the United States foolishly financed this attempt, but France, with a keen sense of realities protected herself against its inevitable collapse."

NO ATTEMPT TO SHUT OFF INQUIRY

Vigorous Debate Expected to Develop in the House of Commons on Beauharnois Report.

OTTAWA, July 24—A vigorous debate is expected in the House of Commons on the report of the Committee investigating the Beauharnois project. Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, the chairman, and other members of the Committee are hard at work preparing the report with the assistance of Peter White, counsel for the Committee. It may be presented on Monday.

Should the report not be satisfactory to the Liberal members on the Committee the way will be open to them to move an amendment setting forth their views. One rumor is that they may ask for a Royal Commission but this will depend on the nature of the report.

During the hearing it was announced by Chairman Gordon, Robert Gardiner and others that who ever happens the interests of those who invested in the project, banks, bondholders, etc., would be protected and without doubt this will be taken up fully in the report.

Today strong denials were made to rumors that there had been a "saw-off" between the Conservatives and Liberals in regard to prosecuting investigations further into campaign funds. "There never was a suggestion to close the taking of evidence," said Mr. Gordon. "I never heard of such a thing, and no such agreement was made or even suggested." Other members corroborated the Chairman's declaration.

LEA AND WRIGHT IN SORRY PLIGHT

Messrs. Strong, Morrison And Dr. W. J. McMillan Score Signal Triumph At Travellers Rest. Hon. Horace Wright Forced To Apologize For Misstatement, Premier Roars And Bellows Under Lash Of Criticism, While Audience Leaves Hall, Saying "Good By, Mr. Lea!"

The third meeting in the campaign of the Fourth Electoral district of Prince was held at Travellers Rest Friday night and was a great triumph for the Conservative candidates, Messrs Strong and Morrison.

Repeating to the sneering remarks of Mr. Lea re his being a lawyer, Mr. Strong said that the Premier should be the last one to speak of lawyers as he has no less than 5 lawyers running as his candidates. In the 3rd district the Premier had deposed Mr. Harry Darby and ran a young lawyer from Charlottetown. In the second district last year because, he said, he needed a lawyer in his cabinet, he had refused to take a native of the district. He is running the Attorney General again this year in the 1st district, where the oldest Liberal member of the House, the Hon. Jeremiah Blanchard has been deposed and so on down the line. The Premier says one thing at one place and another thing at another place and then if it does not suit, repudiates it as he does his platform of 1927. (Loud Applause.)

MR. LEA ON DEFENSIVE
Hon. Mr. Lea was the next speaker and took up all his time in defending his government. He said

that all Governments had been economical in expenditures and it was ridiculous to say that we have not been economical. In reply to the statement that he had no platform he said a platform was only a bunch of promises and "most of you are fed up on promises." He again repudiated the Liberal platform of 1927 saying that cranberries was a hobby of Mr. Saunders' and not of his. Horse breeding was a hobby of his. He claimed that the Liberal Party never introduced Prohibition and they only promised to support it because the Conservatives had run on Government Control. The Premier stated that the famous \$1400 detective was not brought down here to investigate liquor conditions but to inspect a fire. He admitted that the detective had proved to be a failure but his government had paid the detective because the agency which employed him insisted that his government pay him. 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Lea Blames "Lawyer" For Cranberry Pledge in His 1927 Platform

Audience Gasps While Premier Of The Province Repudiates Pledge On Which He Was Elected. Government Speakers Write Under Lash Of Opposition Criticism At Cape Traverse Meeting.

Messrs. Morrison and Strong, opposition candidates in the fourth district of Prince, having the courage of their convictions present an array of political facts and figures that considerably ruffle their opponents, who deemed it proper to reply with slurring remarks.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 26—According to a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics the production of coal from Canadian mines during June amounted to 887,859 tons, a falling off of 33.8 per cent from the 1926-1930 average for the month of 1,342,223 tons. The current month's output consisted of 806,344 tons of bituminous coal, 65,066 tons of lignite coal and 16,449 tons of sub bituminous coal. Nova Scotia's output 413,212 tons.

Sacred Rain Dance Gets Results

WINNIPEG, Man., July 26—Revival of the ancient and sacred rain dance of northern Saskatchewan Indians, despite the prohibition of the strange rites by government agents, is reported to have occurred recently. Parched fields and suffering cattle waterless and foodless, required action. The drought had taken heavy toll and Chief Buffalo Bow, head of the Pilehills reserve, decided upon drastic measures, to invoke the Great Spirit. And the Great Spirit answered the plea. Shortly after the mystic rites had been performed the rain commenced and continued for two days, July 14 and 15, bringing relief to the parched crops and pasture lands not only in the north but in southern areas of Saskatchewan. The sacred dance for rain centered about the great tree on the bark of which the petition for aid had been crudely carved. The ceremony continued for 48 hours, six singers, in relays, chanted the mystic sounds while dancers stepped for two days and nights without pause.

Passengers Killed In Plane Crash

Triumph Scored by Conservatives At Pownal Meeting

MacMillan And MacLean Given Splendid Hearing In One Time Liberal Stronghold.

"Liberal Pownal is broken" was the consensus of opinion following the joint political meeting held in the hall at that place Saturday evening. The Conservative candidates, Messrs Shaw McMillan and George McLean presented arguments which confounded the Liberal candidates, Messrs J. J. Larrabee, and Callum Bruce. The meeting was very orderly and four of the candidates received a good hearing, but Hon. B. W. LePage who assisted the Liberal speakers was heckled several times by the audience. Mr. Larrabee as at previous meetings stated that the St. John Cotton Mill had been forced to close its doors as a result of the Bennett Government tariff policy. Mr. George McLean replied that the cotton mill had been closed for three years.

The chairman was Mr. William J. McEachern, Mount Albion. Mr. J. J. Larrabee, who was the opening speaker maintained that the Government came before the people with its record as a platform. He stated that Dr. McMillan's criticism of the Premier as being more interested in animal husbandry than in public health was a sneer at the farmers. Mr. Larrabee attempted to defend the purchase by Hon. J. P. McIntyre of road machinery by telephone. He claimed that the roads had been vastly improved during the Liberal regime.
