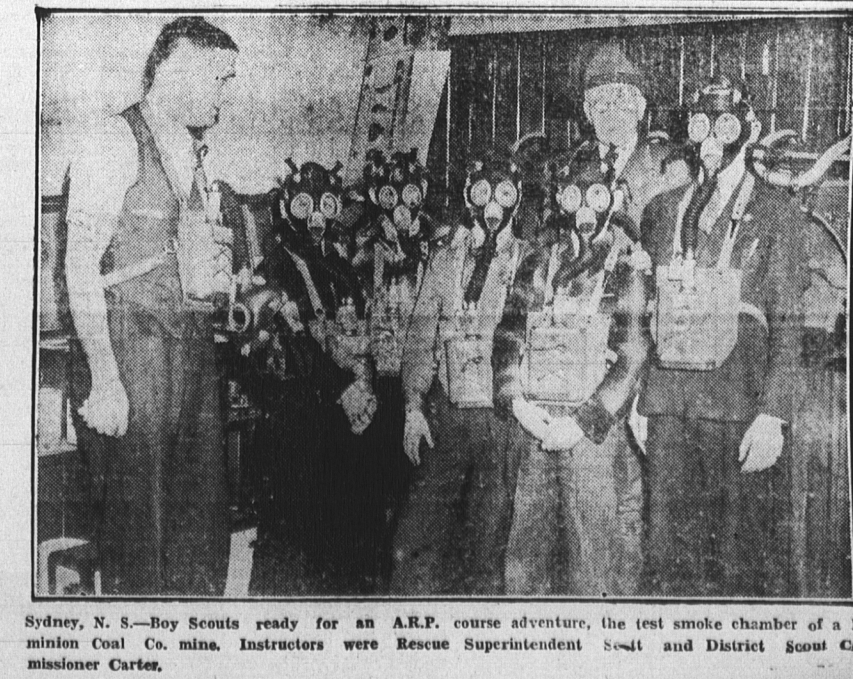
Production Leaps
