The home of John Clarkin, North Wiltshire, was placed in mourning on Saturday evening, 27th inst., when his venerable mother calmly passed away at the age of 86 years.

The late Mrs. Clarkin was born in Yarmouth, N. S., in the early part of the last century her family moved to Crown Point, Lot 49, where her early life was spent.

She may be considered a pioneer of Wiltshire, when in the forties she with her husband, Patrick Clarkin, long since deceased, settled there, it compared feebly with the Wiltshire of today.

She led an edifying christian life, her teaching to her children was always by example. Her's being a disposition to please, her long life glided smoothly along until at the great age of eighty-two, she quietly stepped into her second childhood in which blissful state she remained until awakened by the summons from her Supreme Judge.

The large funeral procession, in which were included a number of grand children and great-grand children, followed her remains to St. Ann's Church on Monday 29th inst., where the funeral obsequies were rendered and a high mass of Requiem offered by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Curran, after which the mortal remains of Mrs. Clarkin were placed in their final home in the adjoining cemetery.
