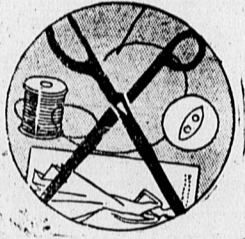

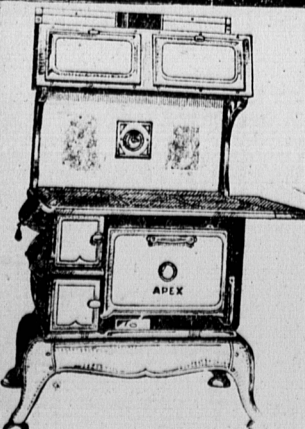

It is a well known fact that fish always return to their own breeding grounds and naturally if the young fish and the spawn are allowed to be netted before they have left the rivers there will be less mature fish return in the fall. More stringent laws should be enforced in regard to taking fish from the rivers in the spring of the year.—S.
