**GERMANY TRYING TO BUY SUBMARINE BASE.**

WASHINGTON.—Reports have reached the Government from a source described as reliable that Germany is attempting to get control of the island of Margarita, off the coast of Venezuela, for use as a submarine base.

The State Department has forwarded the information to Venezuela for the consideration of President Gomez. The exact nature of the advices is withheld, but officials permitted it to

become known that the report had caused some concern here.

**3,450,000 PAIRS OF SHOES**

WASHINGTON—Contracts for 3,450,000 pairs of shoes for the army and navy were awarded today through the national defence council. Delivery is to be completed within eight months, and the average price per pair will be \$4.85. The total contract calls for the expenditure of nearly \$17,000,000.
