At nine o'clock yesterday morning the temperature registered 47 degrees above zero; the warmest yesterday was 48; and at nine o'clock last night the mercury had sunk to 28. A little over half an inch of rain fell during the night which began last Tuesday night and lasted till yesterday. The wind at times blew a velocity of thirty miles an hour, though the gusts were of short duration. Occasional blasts measured forty miles. The general direction of the wind was south east.

The Union Prayer meeting last night in Zion Church was largely attended, the meeting being of an earnest and enthusiastic character, as most eloquent and elevating address was delivered by Rev. G. M. Campbell the Field Secretary of the Canadian Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Among other things said the speaker was the fact that last year was the banner year of the Society. During the one hundred and three years of its organization the Society has distributed 205,000,000 bibles. Last year the Society distributed 6,000,000. Two years ago there was founded the Canadian Branch of the Society, and during 1907 the Bible was distributed in Canada in sixty different languages. There are now seventy-three different languages and nation alities in Canada. During the year 5,000 families came to Canada, and took possession of 12,000 square miles of wheat land, and all the nations of the world appear to be coming. The object of the Canadian branch is to get the bible to every one in his own language. In ten years, Mr. Campbell said, will reap the benefit of what is being done today. Egyptians and Turks are coming in and Mormonism is nothing more than the introduction of the Oriental harem. The Continental Sabbath is being introduced. The address was listened to with great interest. Tonight the meeting will be held in the First Methodist church, the speaker being Rev. T. F. Fullerton.
