SEED TREATMENT BRINGS HIGH CORN YIELD

Increases of from 1.7 to 2.4 bushels per acre were recorded when 18 varieties of hybrid corn were treated with "Ara-san" (tetramethyl thiuram disulphide)

over a two-year test period at the Illinois Agricultural Experimental Station, it is reported in C-I-L Agricultural News. An analysis of the results showed the average increase was nearly nine bushels per acre.

Pointers On Growing Tomatoes

(Experimental Farms News)

Tomatoes are usually set out in the garden or field during the last week of May or first week of June. If the plants have been grown from seed they should have been transplanted to boxes or flats and spaced from two to three inches apart. These plants should be put outside for a week or ten days before setting out, covering them only when there is danger of frost, says Wm. Ferguson, Division of Horticulture, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

If the plants are bought choose those which are strong, healthy, well hardened off and of a suitable variety.

The garden or field should be prepared about five to seven days before setting out. If possible, choose a rich loam, warm and well drained. The soil should be thoroughly worked up and fertilizer worked well into the soil using a 2-12-10 mixture at 1,000 pounds per acre or 3 ounces per square yard.

When transplanting make a hole deep enough to set the plant one or two inches deeper than it was in the flat. Pour a pint of "starter" or fertilizer solution into the hole. Set the plant in the hole taking care to keep a good ball of earth around the roots and distribute them as little as possible. Slope the plant slightly to the direction of the prevailing wind. Fill in the hole and firm the soil about the roots. A "starter" or fertilizer solution can be prepared using one of the fertilizer mixtures sold for this purpose or use a 4-12-8 mixture dissolved at the rate of 8 pounds in 20 gallons of water (2 ounces in 1 gallon of water).

The plants may be spaced in various ways depending on the method of culture. For field culture they can be set four to five feet apart each way or in rows six feet apart and three feet apart in the row. If they are to be tied to stakes the rows should be four feet apart with the plants two feet apart in the row.

When plants are being grown on stakes, they are usually trained to one or more stems. Shortly after the plants are set out one or two are tied to the stakes or a wire trellis using soft twine or raffia for tying. The leaves and blossom clusters which grow out from these stems should not be removed. But all lateral growth which develops from the axils or places where the leaves join the main stem should be pinched or cut out.

This method of growing will usually produce well shaped, clean, smooth fruit and earlier than plants which are allowed to grow on the ground.
