Phosphoric Acid as a Fertilizer

Experiments have shown that plants will die before reaching maturity, unless they have phosphoric acid to feed upon. Phosphates appear to perform three distinct functions.

FIRST. They aid in the nutrition of the plant by furnishing the needed quantities of phosphoric acid.

SECOND. They aid the plant, in some way not well understood, to make use of or assimilate other ingredients. Phosphates are found in the seeds of plants, and as already stated, a plant does not come to maturity and so does not produce seeds, unless phosphates are present in the soil for the plants to feed upon.

THIRD. Certain forms of phosphates render the albuminoids sufficiently soluble to enable them to be carried from the growing parts of plants to the seeds, in which they accumulate in quantity.

Trainers of light harness horses have for years contended that it is impossible for them to get their horses ready for the races earlier in the season than July, owing to weather conditions, yet the news comes from far Northwest Canada that the first trotter and pacer to take records in standard time for the season of 1911, did it in that cold country the first week in May.

At the matinee at Ingalls Park mile track, Joliet, Ill., on the same day, May 30th, in the pacing races, miles were reeled off in 2:12 and 2:13 and quarters in better than 30 seconds. The fact that such a feat was accomplished by many other well attended amateur meets throughout the country on that day, that horses can be prepared and raced with safety the last week in May, or even earlier, without going to far away California or the sunny South, is a fact that campaign managers, as well as owners of campaigning stables, would do well to consider.

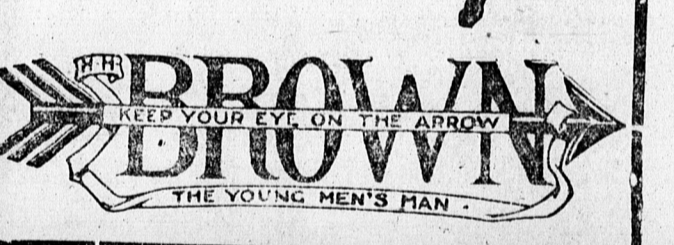

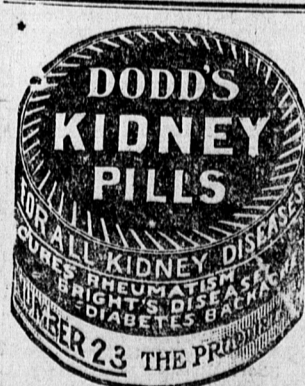

from other states and cities and give more support to all lines of business than any other annual events in all towns and cities fortunate enough to possess a race track. Merchants lay in extra stock and carry larger advertisements; hotels make special preparations and take on more help, amusement resorts add extra attractions and; in fact, all lines of business are materially benefited. Nor is the beneficial effect purely local. It extends to the farms and great breeding establishments in every part of the Union and the horse adds greatly to the wealth of the nation.
