### Murder-Suicide Verdict Given in Double Death

MONTREAL, June 26 — Mrs. Claudia St. Martin, 30, died in hospital today, a suicide, after fatally shooting 48-year-old Raymond Beaudry in an early-morning drama in a Lagache hotel. Street rooming house in the heart of Montreal's Chinatown.

The murder-suicide verdict was returned at a coroner's inquest, at which the testimony revealed that Beaudry was shot three times and Mrs. St. Martin, after running into the street, met her self-inflicted death by placing the muzzle of a revolver into her mouth and firing. She died a few minutes after being admitted to hospital.

In a farewell to her parents, Mrs. St. Martin, an unemployed munitions plant worker, wrote in paper on a crude sheet of paper:
