



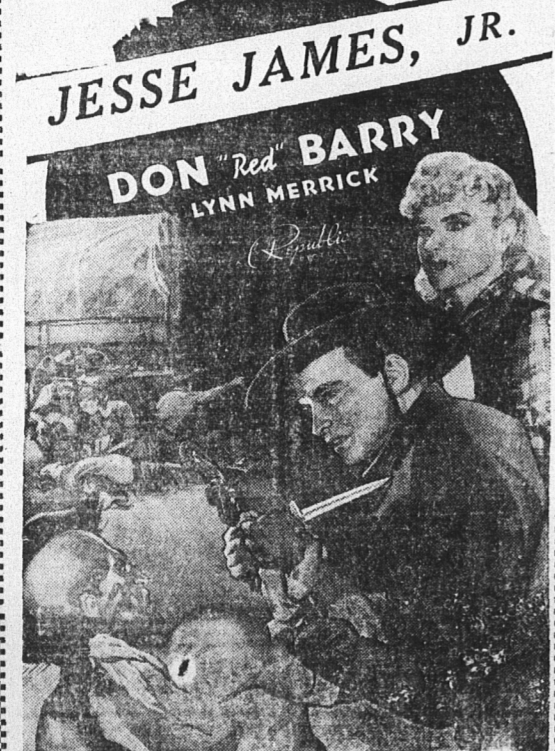

## Freight Assistance Figures Are Given

OTTAWA, May 13—(CP)—Government payments as freight assistance on the movement of feed grain from the west to eastern Canada totalled \$3,781,264 up to and including May 8, said a return tabled in the House of Commons today for King Hazen (Con. Saint John-Albert) by Agriculture Minister Gardiner. The return said grain and feeds had been transported through the regular channels of trade, wholesale, retail, co-operative organizations and individuals, and it was not considered practicable to furnish details about all those concerned in the movement. Administrative work was done under direction of the agriculture department and the staff involved was paid in the regular way through the treasury office.

## Canada's Girls In Front Line On West Coast

VICTORIA, May 13—(CP)—No one turns to stare at women in khaki in Pacific coast military centres any more, which leads the members of the Canadian Women's Army Corps to believe they've been accepted by the servicemen with whom they work. Slowly but surely trim young women are taking over jobs which will release A and B category men for more military forms of service. More than 400 women are now on active service in British Columbia and to meet the steadily-expanding force new quarters will be opened at Work Point barracks here about June 1 to accommodate 200. The first C.W.A.C. barracks in British Columbia are at nearby Gordon Head, where there is room for some 75 women who will serve as cooks, waitresses, drivers, mechanics and stenographers.

All members of the C. W. A. C. in British Columbia are women whose homes are in the province, coming largely from Victoria, Vancouver, the Okanagan valley. Their ages average between 20 and 30 years. At present no one under 21 may be enlisted but the age limit shortly is to be dropped to 18.

Staff officers of the C. W. A. C. in Military District 11 is Junior Cmdr. P. Lee-Wright. Before organization of the C. W. A. C. the recruiting office here and was a member of the British Columbia women's service corps.

Once the C. E. members of the C. W. A. C. are issued uniforms they must wear them at all times except when on furlough. On enlistment they receive a brief probationary period and then are known as "volunteers," the equivalent of privates. No one who is accepted as a businesswoman before the war, like Sgt. E. Harvey of Courtenay, is attached to headquarters. She has been in the C. W. A. C. since September, 1941.

In addition to the barracks at Gordon Head and those building at Work Point, the C. W. A. C. has permanent quarters in a hut at Camp Nanaimo near Nanaimo, B.C.
