### Communists Active In Mining Areas?

OTTAWA, Feb. 23—(CP)—Increased activity among union organizers in the mining areas of Northern Ontario probably indicates nothing more than a big-scale membership drive, a Labor Department official said tonight.

But he did not rule out the possibility of a link between the stepped-up organization work of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (I.M.S.W.) and a rumored influx of Communists from the United States.

"That remains 'an open question,'" he said.

From a high official of the Canadian Congress of Labor, with which the Smelters' Union is affiliated, came a denial that intensified Communist activity in Northern Ontario.
