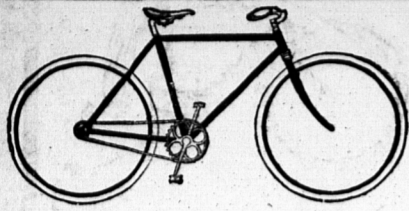

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THE RECIPROcity DEBATE IN THE PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

(Continued from page 3.) not consistent with each other. He argued that in cattle and horses Canada stood to lose by free trade; that Canada has now about the best horse market in the world and that it would be sheer folly to open it to be flooded by thirteen countries, or any one of them. He predicted that the country when appealed to would be found hostile to the agreement. HON. L. McDONALD had listened with amazement to the arguments from the opposition side. It was ridiculous to assume that reciprocity would reduce the price of pork here. It might be that to some extent the price of pork was governed by Chicago, but it was more true that it was ruled from England, that great free trade country. He cited the much higher prices for cream and butter last year than here and the great development in that trade since the duty was reduced. He had a vivid memory of the splendid prices our farmers obtained under the old reciprocity treaty. After the treaty was abrogated the prices fell. He had sold oats at 24 cents at a store and traded out the price, could not get a dollar of cash. Many farmers had hauled their oats long distances and sold them in that way. He had no fear of Denmark sending butter here while the great British market stood between. He had no fear of any of the other countries except possibly Argentina, but he hoped the favored nation treaty between Britain and that country would be abrogated. He should be glad and grateful that Messrs Fielding and Patterson had made such a favorable arrangement to give us access to the market of ninety millions of people. It was more favorable than the treaty of 1854 and stands as a monument to their skill and ability. He agreed that it is well for the farmer to feed his crops on the farm but under reciprocity some raw products might be sold to advantage in the American market and fertilizers brought to make good the loss to the soil. But the price must be good to afford this God help the farmer who is forced to sell his potatoes for 16 and 17 cents a bushel, as has been done! He charged that the members opposite had all been in favor of reciprocity, when the late Hon. Dan'l Gordon stood alone in opposition to it. In conclusion he reviewed the national policy and other matters. He believed the farmers are intelligent enough to see and know the great benefits which reciprocity must bring them. MR. WYATT followed, stating that as the House would adjourn at 6 and the Leader of the House had not yet spoken, he would be brief. He congratulated the previous speaker on his earnest effort. He thought in our past relations with the United States they had dealt with us in a friendly spirit. They framed hostile tariffs against us, and if we attempted an agreement with them they always insisted on the best of the bargain. Now, what are we to give and what are we to get? He argued that a true reciprocity would be between two countries whose products were different from each other. Then such free exchange would be mutually beneficial. In the present case our products are largely the same. He thought the repeal of the old treaty, although it was a severe blow at the time had been really a benefit to Canada. It hastened confederation, brought us together and made us more self reliant. We must not be deceived by the term reciprocity, for it is not a true reciprocity that we are getting. The National Policy was designed to stimulate home industry, to check the exodus that was draining Canada of its life blood, to prevent this country being made a slaughter market, and it had done all these things with the result that Canada was built up and raised to a great height of prosperity. Trade had expanded beyond precedent, and the Finance Minister was announcing large annual surpluses. Why should we risk all this in an agreement the results of which no man can forecast? He went on to show how the livestock area, and the volume of farm products had increased, attributing these mainly to the protective system inaugurated by Sir John Macdonald. He quoted from a speech of American Senator Beveridge to show that their manufacturers had been forced to erect vast factories on this side of the border, giving large employment to Canadian labor. He argued that reciprocity would endanger all this. At 6 o'clock the House adjourned till ten o'clock tomorrow morning.
