CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

President McDonald Outlines Aims and Objects of the Society and Reviews the Work of the Year.

At the meeting of the Children's Aid Society on Friday evening the President, Mr. A. A. McDonald submitted his report as follows:—

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen: Since our last annual meeting death has claimed our respected President, the late lamented Dr. Conroy. The Doctor was the first Chief Executive officer of the Society, and so capable and satisfactorily did he fill the chair that he was re-elected President at each succeeding annual meeting.

The Children's Aid Society was instituted about ten years ago for the purpose of endeavoring to have young boys and girls who had taken the first steps in a downward career of crime from being sent to the common jail, there to herd perhaps, with hardened criminals, or to the penitentiary either of which method of correction would leave a black mark against them for all time, even if released with character redeemed.

I will not weary you by rehearsing what has been accomplished under the auspices of the Society in the years that have passed. Suffice it to say that the doors of the Mt. Herbert and St. Vincent's Orphanages have been thrown wide open to us, and numbers of delinquent and neglected children who have become by law wards of the society, are being cared for, and brought up and educated under the best social conditions within the walls of these highly deserving charitable institutions.

During the year 1918, nineteen delinquent, neglected and orphan children were made wards of the Society, eleven of whom were placed in Mt. Herbert Orphanage, two in St. Vincent's Orphanage, one in the Maritime Home for girls at Truro, where

we already had a young girl, one in the St. John Industrial Home for boys, two in St. Patrick's Industrial Home, Halifax, and two left in their Mother's charge.

One whole family of children, bereft of the care of a good Mother by the prevailing epidemic, were placed in Mt. Herbert Orphanage for the time being.

A boy who was committed to St. Patrick's Home two years ago, returned to the city some months since with
