AD WEATHER FORGED FLIERS TO COME DOWN

Companions Arrive in Azores on Board Italian Steamer Super-ga-Plane Slightly Damaged.

Commander Francisco De Pinedo, Italian aviator, arrived here this morning on the Italian steamer Super-ga, which had his seaplane, the Santa Maria II in tow.

When about 250 miles from Flores Island, the most westerly of the Azores group, the Portuguese schooner Infante Sagres was sighted.

The steamer proceeded very slowly to avoid further damage to the plane. Commander De Pinedo expressed deep gratitude to the assistance rendered both by the Infante Sagres and Super-ga.
