France Resumes Relations with Russia

(Dom. Press Special.) PARIS, July 16.—Newspaper despatches from Spa confirmed the report that France has decided to resume relations with Russia, providing for the Russo-Polish armistice proposed by Great Britain.

Wrangel Refuses To Leave Crimea

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, July 16.—A dispatch from Spa to The Times today reported that the British Government accepted the Russian proposal for peace with Poland and suggested the conference be held in Brest-Litovsk instead of London. The Times said it was reliably informed that General Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik leader refused to withdraw from the Crimea holding that the people there were happy and he was not justified in handing them over to the ruthless Red soldiers.

Contradictory Report From Bolsheviks

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, July 16.—A wireless from Moscow today says: "To west of Molodchyno the Soviet armies are approaching the old German frontier. Our troops have crossed the River Villa on a wide front. The Poles are resisting fiercely on the entire front between Dubno and Danester. An official Polish communique from Warsaw today said Wednesday the Poles destroyed one Red Division and a brigade of General Budenis cavalry near Rovno, Southern Polesia. The Poles had been retreating to the River Sdr."

Habeas Corpus For Ecrement

(Dom. Press Special.) NEW YORK, July 16.—Eugene F. McGee, Attorney for Arthur Ecrement held at Ellis Island for deportation to Canada, yesterday obtained a writ of Habeas Corpus in the federal court. McGee claims Ecrement's arrest, detention and deportation were illegal and asks for his release from custody.

Drop In Wheat

(Dom. Press Special.) CHICAGO, July 16.—Wheat prices fell on the Chicago Board of Trade today. December wheat is off six cents at \$2.62, March is off 8 cents at \$2.74. The decline, traders said, is due chiefly to heavy selling by foreign interests. Other factors were the large export, free coverings and considerable hedging.

De Valera Arrives in New York

NEW YORK, July 16.—Eamon De Valera, so-called President of the Irish Republic, arrived at New York yesterday from Chicago, and is now preparing for an educational campaign which he hopes will lead the American people to demand of Congress the recognition of the Republic of Ireland. On Sunday night he will appear with Archbishop Hayes and Mannix at a reception. Mannix is expected to advise De Valera as to the best policy to pursue.

Silent Memento Of Lusitania

PHILADELPHIA, July 16.—A life jacket silent remembrance of the tragic sinking of the Lusitania five years ago and bearing a strand of faded blonde hair was picked up yesterday in the Delaware. The name of the ship the Germans torpedoed still remains clear and distinct on the wave beaten canvas which has been adrift on the seas throughout three years of war and two of peace. The life jacket, which was found by two railroad detectives, was covered with slime and seaweed with one arm strap broken. On one side were the words "life-belt" and on the other in large black letters the inscription "Lusitania."

Killed When Train Hits Automobile

TRURO, N.S., July 15.—A shocking fatality occurred at Brookfield at 2 o'clock this afternoon when Stanley Sutherland of that place received injuries from which he died an hour later. Mr. Sutherland, who was thirty-five years of age and a well known mill owner, was crossing the railway track at Brookfield Station in an automobile when the car was struck by the Halifax bound maritime express. The locomotive hit the rear wheel of the automobile on the off side and smashed the machine to pieces. Mr. Sutherland, who was alone in the car, was thrown some distance and so badly injured that he died an hour afterward never regaining consciousness. He had come in from Brentwood a few miles away where he had a sawmill and was proceeding to Brookfield station where he had men loading lumber.

In his immediate family he is survived by a wife and five small children. Mrs. Sutherland, who was formerly Miss Flo Clarke, is a sister of the late Abner Clarke who died a few weeks ago as the result of an accident at Shubenacadie station when one of his legs was cut off by a train. Other relatives are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A.K. Sutherland, of Brookfield; two brothers, Lyman Sutherland, of Truro, and George Sutherland, of Forest Glen; and three sisters, Mrs. L.A. Ryan, Truro; Mrs. W.I. Dodge, Truro, and Mrs. Allen Wright, Forest Glen.

New Brunswick's Hay Crop Below That of Last Year

POOR PROSPECTS PRODUCE HIGH GRASS PRICES. POTATO PROSPECTS IN SISTER PROVINCE ALSO BELOW THE AVERAGE.

FREDERICTON, N.B., July 14.—New Brunswick's hay crop this year will be one third less than in 1919 according to the official report given out by the provincial department of agriculture this morning.

Prospects for a considerably reduced crop have already affected prices for standing grass, in spite of the fact that there has been a considerable improvement during the past several weeks. As high as \$13 per ton for standing hay is said to have been paid while lump sums being paid for fields are in some cases twice what was received last year.

The official crop report also indicated that the yield in the principal potato growing counties will be "greatly lessened," from various counties although the reports vary in the different localities and are favorable from the northern and eastern counties. The eastern section of the province is said to have suffered considerably from the destructive operations of the cut worm on all garden crops, while local gardeners have also been finding them very plentiful this year.

Italians Threaten Vengeance on Albanians

ROME, July 16.—Italians at Spalato are threatening vengeance upon Albanians who are charged with starting troubles in that city resulting in the killing of several Italians and in burning scores. A dispatch to the Epoca stated that Gabrielle D'Annunzio, Italian poet, aviator of Fiume promised aid to the Italian inhabitants of the city against the Albanian mob and devastated the premises of Hungarians, the Croatian Bank of Spalato, several Jugo Slav shops also were damaged by the mobs.

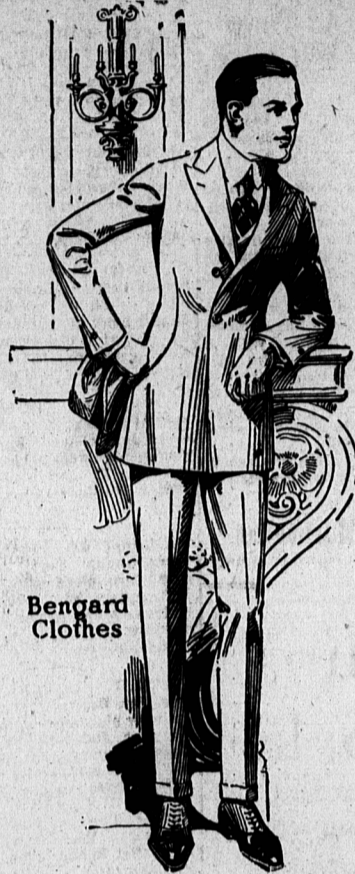
Good Progress on Mercantile Fleet

OTTAWA, July 14.—Such satisfactory progress is being made with the construction of Canada's Mercantile Marine Fleet that it is believed in government circles that the whole fleet of sixty three vessels will be in commission by March 31 next, the end of the current fiscal year. Up to the present time, 32 vessels have been finished and splendid headway is being made with the other half of the fleet. Particularly good headway is being made at the Montreal St. John, Collingwood and Port Arthur yards.

Several vessels of large tonnage being built in inland yards will be utilized on ocean going services and it will be necessary to bring them through the canal to the St. Lawrence in sections.

THE LATE AMBROSE L. BROWN

The death occurred at 8 o'clock yesterday morning at his home on Euston Street, this city of Mr. Ambrose Lane Brown, one of our best known and most respected citizens. Although past the advanced age of three score and ten by a goodly number of years he remained active to the very last, thereby achieving the desire of his life, to die in the harness. The older inhabitants of this city and province will recall how much the deceased contributed to its commercial and moral wealth. For years he was part proprietor of what was then one of the largest dry goods houses in the Maritime Provinces, the memory of which still continues in the pile of buildings known as the Brown Block. He was the buyer for the firm and made many trips to the European markets. In the latter years of his life he was connected with the Customs Department. He was a life long member of St. James Church in this city being associated with the Sabbath School for over half a century and a member of the Kirk session for nearly half a century. The late Mr. Brown was a man of strict integrity in business and

The last member of a much respected family passed away at Millview on May the 9th, 1920. We refer to the death of Miss Ester Mutlow which occurred at her home on eighty-fourth year and was a daughter of the late Thomas Mutlow and Catherine Jenkins his wife.
