B. E., who upon the death of Premier J. D. Stewart was appointed Premier and carried on the affairs of the Government until the election of 1935 his record as leader of the Government during those two years was such that his party was completely wiped out in the 1935 election. Since Dr. MacMillan entered politics in 1923 he was twice defeated in 1923 he was elected in 1926 and the past twelve years he has spent in opposition.

My opponent, Mr. Donald MacLean speaking over the radio last night in support of the C. C. F. party, spent a good deal of his time advocating government ownership of fertilizer plants. I would have thought that Mr. MacLean would have advocated the taking over of the Canada Packers plant here in Charlottetown but that would be agreeing with the action of the Jones Government in the strike period, but then again it might offend his friends in the C. I. O.

C. C. F. Statement

I was in Calgary in November, 1943, the day after Harold Winch, leader of the C.C.F. Party in British Columbia made the statement that his party would take over the banks and big businesses and if they did not come peacefully they would use force to take them over. The Minister of Public Works of British Columbia, a Conservative, was in Calgary at the time and he said the C.C.F. party in British Columbia was the Communist Party.

Although Mr. MacLean painted a glowing picture of what the Government of Saskatchewan was doing he failed to mention the excessive land taxes paid by farmers in that Province. Taxes there average close to \$200.00 per farm per year.

The debt reductions in the Province of Saskatchewan came about through the cancellation, by the King Government, of millions of dollars of debts incurred by that Province during the depression years which they were unable to pay.

Dr. MacMillan speaking at Tignish, N.S., December 4th is reported to have amused the audience by referring to Barbour's Bogs on the main highway at Springfield. He failed to tell the audience that this road was paved by the Tories without having a bad surface at times. Last year Dr. MacMillan complained about the Department putting too much gravel on the O'Leary road. I don't think that he would be the first to get upset on there because there was a lot of traffic on the road. If the Liberal Party is elected on December 11th the O'Leary road will be paved as soon as possible and also the road through the village of Tyne Valley will be paved.

Social Security

The last two lines of plank no. 3 of the Liberal Platform reads as follows: "The work formerly done by the Relief Committee will now come under the Social Security Board and will include applications from the permanently crippled." This is a very important announcement of Government policy. I visited a poor home in the second district in 1935 in which were three crippled children. Two youngest have since passed away and there is now a crippled boy about fourteen years in that home. These children were a terrible care to their mother and the work of looking after them weighed heavily upon her. This woman is just as much entitled to twenty-five dollars per month for the care of her child as is anyone entitled to twenty-five dollars per month for an old age pension. This plank in the Liberal platform will bring relief to many poor homes in this Province where money is greatly needed for the care of the crippled children in the home.

The attention of the electors should be drawn to Section 210 of "The Election Act" which states as follows: "Any person, not being a voter, who resides outside of this Province, and who, to secure the election of any candidate, canvasses for votes or in any way endeavours to induce voters to vote for any candidate at an election, or to refrain from voting, is guilty of an offence and is liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars and costs, and not less than one hundred dollars and costs, or in default of payment of such fine and costs to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, with or without hard labour."

The Election Act was passed in 1922 before the C. C. F. Party ever heard tell of in Prince Edward Island. I notice that Mr. Fred Young, Halifax, was advertised to speak at Bloomfield Station on November 26th and Mr.

ent from the campaign and to give my full support thrown behind him. There is only one conclusion—the C.C.F. has no such land policy as he inferred and the Attorney General owes it to the general public to set the record straight by a public statement on the matter. For his party to lamely try to back out of their fix by saying that this is a long term policy of the party is rather weak. Nowhere in any C.C.F. platform can they find such a policy—long term or short term.

The non-appearance of the Attorney General this morning shows one other thing—namely that he and the Party he represents have sent themselves to an undignified and vicious smear campaign which is unworthy of political leaders in this Province. The full page ad in today's papers simply underlines this fact. I think that all of us regardless of political affiliation, feel a keen sense of disappointment that the Attorney General of our Island Province should lend himself to tactics of this sort.

The ad today is on a par with the Attorney General's address and just as incapable of proof. You will notice that the quotations are from newspaper reports, written by hostile reporters and published in hostile papers—and all of you know how newspaper reports can be twisted to serve a purpose. These quotations are all taken out of their contexts, they have been repeatedly used in other Provinces against the C. C. F. and they have been repeatedly denied by C.C.F. leaders. Evidently they think we are still rather gullible in this Province.

Even supposing that these words were said by Mr. Winch, let us remember that Mr. Winch is only one individual in the C. C. F. Party. The whole C.C.F. cannot be held responsible for what any one person may say, any more than the whole Liberal party should be held responsible for what Premier Jones, for example, may say.

Does it not strike you as strange that in P.E.I. the old parties go near to British Columbia to find a man to misquote. In British Columbia they quote Maritime C. C. F. leaders. Distance evidently lends safety, especially this close to the election.

The C. C. F. is challenging this Province with the idea of clean politics and clean elections. We have made our pledge to the electorate not to use liquor or money on election day. So far the other

parties have said nothing on this and have replied with abuse. Let them tell us how they stand on this matter.
