OTTAWA ANNOUNCES RUBBER REGULATIONS AFFECTING CANADIAN MOTORISTS. THE NEW REGULATIONS PERMIT THE MANUFACTURE OF THE FOLLOWING TIRES, TUBES AND REPAIR MATERIALS: (a) Tires seven inches or more in cross-section (industry marking) for other than private passenger cars, and tubes for same. (b) Tractor tires and farm implement tires. (c) Tires and tubes for delivery to manufacturers of motor vehicles to be used for equipping new motor vehicles made for sale in Canada, on the understanding that no spare tire or tube will be supplied to the vehicle manufacturer for any such vehicle. (d) Tire repair materials, other than tire repair kits. (e) Camelback (tread rubber) for retreading.

NOTICE To Steel DISTRIBUTORS and Processors. EFFECTIVE on December 27, 1941, no person shall, without obtaining a permit, sell, supply, buy, or otherwise acquire, use, or consume new or second-hand, plain or fabricated steel plates, structural shapes, or bars for the construction, remodelling, or repair of any building, container-tank, boiler, bridge, tower, conveyor, or other stationary structure. SEVERE PENALTIES ARE PROVIDED FOR CONTRAVENTIONS OF THIS ORDER. Applications for permits may be made to: F. B. KILBOURN, Steel Controller, Department of Munitions and Supply, Ottawa, Canada.

NOTICE Fourth or final installment on Civic taxes is due and payable on or before the 31st day of December 1941. A discount of 3 per cent is allowable on fourth installment if paid as per the above date.
