At the police court yesterday morning Philip D'gherty, charged with the larceny of a pair of overshoes from R. H. Ramsay & Co's. store, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor. James King, who lives in Es-sory's Lane, was sentenced to twenty days imprisonment for stealing a quantity of coal from Clarkin Bros. at one o'clock on Sunday morning. The value of coal stolen amounted to 20 cents. King admitted the theft and said he wanted the coal to make a fire for himself. Albert P. Allen and Patrick Dennis, charged with drunkenness, were each fined \$5 or ten days. The hearing of the case against Patrick Gormley, charged with the same offence, was adjourned for one week.

OBITUARY.—Died at her residence, Souris East, on Friday, the 10th inst., Mary, the beloved wife of Roderick F. McDonald, in the 45th year of her age. Her illness was la grippe, in so stubborn a form as to set every effort to save her life at defiance. She was of a most amiable and generous disposition, and death robbed the poor of a good friend, and Souris of a much esteemed citizen. Her funeral, which took place on Sunday, the 12th, to St. Mary's church, was unusually large and representative. The procession was headed by the Souris Brass Band, under the management of Dr. McLellan and Mr. Shaw, and rendered the dead march and other appropriate music very impressively. They were followed by the two attending physicians, Drs. McIntyre and McLean. The pallbearers were John McLean, Esq., Fredk. E. Morrow, Esq., Capt. J. D. Lavie, Mr. James McQuaid, Michael McCormack Esq. and Mr. Michael Paquette. The hearse was followed by the mourners in sleighs, then came over three hundred pedestrians in double file, they were followed by one hundred and twenty sleighs, making a cortege indeed impressive. The service was conducted by the Rev. D. F. McIntyre and Dr. Walker. The music was exquisitely rendered by a full choir, adding materially to the grandeur and solemnity of the occasion. The floral tributes from the friends in Charlottetown and Souris were numerous and elaborate and were fitting decorations for a tastefully selected casket. We tender Mr. McDonald our sincere sympathy in his affliction, and know that he must be buoyed up by the consolation that his deceased wife is now reaping her celestial reward for her christian, charitable life. TO URGE THE GOVERNMENT.

Montague Citizens Pass a Resolution Asking For Legislation on Prohibition.

MONTAGUE, P. E. I. Nov. 10.—On Thursday, March 9th a public Temperance meeting was held in the Hall at Montague in the interests of the temperance question in Canada in view of the recent plebiscite. The following resolution was read from the chair as setting forth the object for which the citizens were called together:

Whereas the people of Canada were afforded an opportunity to express their mind on the desirability of the prohibition by statute of the liquor traffic in Canada.

And Whereas the people of Canada availed themselves of such opportunity, and through the plebiscite on Sept. 29 1898, expressed their mind on the question.

And whereas the desirability of such prohibition was supported by a majority of 13,000 popular votes throughout the Dominion and by majorities in nearly two thirds of the electoral constituencies and further by large majorities in all the territories and provinces except only

Be it therefore resolved that we, the citizens of Montague and vicinity, assembled, respectfully urge upon the government and parliament of Canada, that the wishes of the people—as signified in such majorities of the popular votes—of the constituencies, and of the

provinces, be duly acceded to, through the granting of such legislation as shall initiate the banishment from our land of the liquor traffic with all its associated evils."

The above was moved by Rev. C. S. Turner, seconded by R. W. Stevenson and further supported by Jas. E. Robertson, M. D., Rev. H. Penna, H. Nelson, and D. C. McKinnon, and therefore unanimously voted as the express wish and voice of the citizens.

The resolution is to be sent to the administration at Ottawa, and, Mr. Editor, is it not well that the temperance people of Canada in some such form as the above now ask for that legislation, which, they, by majorities along all lines on Sept. 29th, 1898, said they were in favor of. No doubt such a voice from the combined forces would have a material effect, whereas silence at the present juncture might be misinterpreted and disastrous. A majority of 43 of our representatives are backed by constituencies giving majorities in favor of prohibition. Let these constituencies now jog the memories of their representatives.—Com.
