To Get Good Lawn, Work Early

One purpose of early spring lawn operations is to repair as soon as possible any injury that may have occurred during the winter and to develop a dense, deep-rooted, healthy turf which will withstand summer heat and drought and resist the encroachment of warm weather weeds. To wait until the season is well advanced to undertake improvement measures may prove too late to derive the highest benefit from treatment, says J. H. Boyce, Division of Forage Plants, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. If a white cottony or dirty grayish growth known as snow mould

appears on the turf, it should be broken up by raking or brushing with a stiff broom, because it will seriously injure the turf if permitted to remain.
As soon as the surface of the lawn becomes sufficiently dry, a thorough raking should be given to remove dead grass, leaves and other debris. At this time any bare and thin areas should be reseeded with a good mixture of Grade No. 1 seed. An excellent mixture for this purpose consists of 80 per cent Kentucky blue grass and 20 per cent colonial bent. Red Top may be substituted for part or all of the colonial bent if desired, but the mixture will be somewhat reduced in quality. White clover seed may replace 5 per cent of the Kentucky blue grass. If that species is desired in the lawn. In reseeding, the soil should first be thoroughly scarified by raking, the seed broadcast over the area and lightly raked in, followed by a light rolling. If a dry period follows reseeding, water should be applied in sufficient quantity to prevent the reseeded area drying out. When watering, it is essential to be careful to use a fine spray so that the seed will not be uncovered and washed away.
A suitable program of fertilization is necessary for the maintenance of satisfactory lawns. The spring application is extremely important and should be made just before active growth begins. There are a number of good lawn fertilizers on the market which will produce satisfactory results if applied at the recommended rates. Unless applied before active growth begins, the fertilizer should be watered immediately after application to prevent burning. Hand weeding should start just as soon as the weeds can be recognized and any bare areas resulting from weed removal should be seeded immediately.
The lawn should receive one rolling in the early spring to counteract the heaving which has occurred due to freezing and thawing and

the roller should be just heavy enough to accomplish this purpose. The time when this rolling is done should be carefully chosen and will depend on the conditions of the soil. If the soil is too dry, the roller will have no effect and if too moist the soil will be puddled. This is the only rolling recommended for lawns during the year, since continued rolling will cause soil compaction on all except the lighter soils. Circulars on the construction and care of lawns are available at the Division of Forage Plants, Experimental Farms Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

How every affluent hour leaped hearts and eyes
With treasures of surprise.

Those little hands will find their "treasures of surprise" somewhere and somehow. The difficulty, and the responsibility, too, of mothers and fathers is to provide them, as much as possible, with right tasks. For that time, so soon past, when everything is fair and fresh and new, is a plastic period. It is the springtime for the sowing of influences and impressions.
Little hands now, but hands that

will shape the tomorrow for what it shall be. Hands that will be either skillful and strong or weak and un dependable. Hands that may smooth the later years of those who reared them, or be heedlessly neglected. Busy little hands that alternately vex and gladden. They are entitled to all the time and thought and understanding that can be given them both for what they mean now and for what they

shall do hereafter.—Christian Science Monitor.
FAVOURITE CUT FLOWERS
Of cut flowers and greens grown indoors, 14,679,194 roses, 6,174,301 carnations, 5,753,878 bunch-flowered chrysanthemums, 3,054,953 carnations, 3,461,688 tulips, 3,622,705 large-flowered chrysanthemums, and 2,597,270 sweet peas represented the principal sales in a list of 32 kinds of cut flowers reported sold in Canada in the nursery stock year ended May 31, 1940. The most costly cut flower was the orchid with an average value of \$59.31 per hundred, followed by gardenias (\$21.38) calla (\$9.75) and lilies (\$8.81). Among cut flowers grown outdoors, the gladiolus with 1,446,175 sales was again the favourite flower. The total value of the floricultural and ornamental nursery stock sold in Canada during the year was \$3,324,199.
