NEW STEAMERS.

LONDON, August 12.—The Royal Mail Packet company, it became known to-day, has given orders to a Belfast shipping concern for four new 650 foot passenger liners, for Panama canal traffic to meet anticipated severe German competition. Mr. H. Hayter, an official of the Royal Mail company, in an interview to-day, expressed the opinion that there was no occasion to be disturbed by the action of the American senate in passing the Panama canal bill. He did not believe that the American government seriously would entertain a step calculated to deprive the canal of a considerable source of revenue. In any case he thought the matter could be amicably arranged without making comments distasteful to the United States."

SCHOONER LOST.

MACHIASPORT, Me., August 12.—The loss of the Machias schooner Adie Fuller, and the damaging of the British two-masted schooner Crescent, during the fog last night, became known to-day. The Fuller bound for Eastport, loaded with coal, went ashore at Little River Head. The crew of six men rowed ashore safely. The Crescent, which was bound from Maitland for Vine Haven, struck on Averte, Rock. She was floated later and towed here.

GRAFT IN DETROIT.

DETROIT, Mich., August 12.—All doubt that the alleged confession of Edward Schritter, clerk of the common council, was the basis of the sixteen arrests made in the council, "graft" cases last week, was removed this afternoon, when Prosecuting Attorney Hugh Shepherd, in an interview, told the details of Schritter's confession. Schritter was taken before Police Justice Jeffries to assist in making out warrants against the sixteen aldermen arrested last Friday, and two additional members of the common council, making eighteen in all who will appear in police court tomorrow for examination, some on a charge of accepting a bribe and others on a charge of promising to accept a bribe. Schritter said his aged mother led him to confess.
