**Will Attempt Ascent
of Grand Teton**

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo.,
Aug. 23. (United Press.)—Ar-
rangements now are being made
for an ascent of the Grand Teton,
to be attempted about the end of
August by a party under leadership
of Dr. A. R. Ellingswood, of Lake
Forest College, Lake Forest, Ill.

This peak, the most difficult to
climb in the United States, has
been ascended to its summit only
twice in 60 years, the last time in
August, 1898.

The Ellingswood party will first
visit the Yellowstone National
Park, and then proceed southward
past Jackson Lake to the nearest
point to the Grand Teton, which
can be reached by road, probably
in the vicinity of Bradley Lake. Be-
sides the Grand Teton the party
also will attempt to climb Mount
Moran.

The attempt to ascend the Grand
Teton derives added interest from
the fact that the late President
Harding recently announced his
strong personal approval of the
proposed extension of Yellowstone
Park to include this and neighbor-
ing peaks. The Grand Teton and
vicinity affords the finest Alpine
scenery in America.

The First Ascent.

The ascent of the Grand Teton
was first accomplished on July 29,
1872, by Nathaniel P. Langford,
superintendent of Yellowstone Na-
tional Park, and Captain James
Stevenson of the United States
Geographical Survey.

The second successful ascent
was made on August 11, 1898, by
Rev. F. S. Spalding, of Erie, Pa.,
W. O. Owen of Wyoming and two
assistants, John Shive and Frank
Peterson.

Finding no marks on the summit
to indicate previous ascent, Owen
challenged the claim of Langford
and Stevenson to first ascent, and
started a controversy which has
waged 25 years among mountaineer-
s. A survey of the evidence by
General Chittenden favored the
claim of the Langford-Stevenson
party.

A dozen other attempts to climb
the Grand Teton have been unsuc-
cessful. The great difficulty con-
fronting climbers is the traversing
at a point about six hundred feet
below the summit of a ledge not
over 15 inches in width, 40 feet in
length, skirting a cliff about 3,500
feet high. Ice conditions also weigh
heavily in any attempted ascent.

Owen, who was in the second
successful ascent, now is a resi-
dent of Los Angeles, Calif. He re-
turned to Jackson's Hole, Wyo.,
this summer to survey conditions
with a view to climbing the peak
again next summer.

Sign Post to Pioneers.

After inclusion in the Yellow-
stone Park and the development
of travel in the Teton region, the
ascent of the Grand Teton will
doubtless become a popular pas-
time with mountain climbers. Be-
sides its marvelous scenic beauty,
the Grand Teton is famed in West-
ern history because of its service
to pioneers crossing the plains as a
guide post. It rises very abruptly
7,500 feet above Jackson's Hole,
and in clear weather is readily vis-
ible at more than one hundred
miles distance.

The mountain was named Grand
Teton by early French trappers be-
cause of its fancied resemblance to
a woman's breast. The country
nearby, Jackson's Hole, was known
in early western history as the ren-
devous of outlaws and cattle rust-
lers, and now regards itself the
Last Frontier of America.

**Fifty Years
In Ministry**

Sackville, N. B. Aug. 23.—On St.
Bartholomew's Day, Aug. 24, one
of Sackville's most venerable and
beloved clergymen, Rev. Dr. C. F.
Wiggins, rector of St. Paul's and
St. Ann's (Anglican) churches, will
have completed fifty years in the
work of the ministry; and despite
the fact that he is on the verge of
the octogenarian class his voice
still rings with the oldtime fire of
eloquence and earnestness both in
the pulpit and on the public plat-
form. It is but fitting that mention
should be made of the invaluable
assistance rendered the good doc-
tor in his work here for the last
forty-three years by his devoted
kindly and energetic helpmate, Mrs.
Wiggins.

This faithful priest's services to
the church will be fittingly cele-
brated on Friday next, Aug. 24, when
a special jubilee service will be
held in St. Paul's church in com-
memoration of the fiftieth anniver-
