In Memoriam

MR. WILLIAM COMPTON

In the earlier evening hours of Monday, Aug. 15th, Mr. William Compton, a very highly esteemed resident of Charlottetown, passed away peacefully at his home at the comparatively early age of 69 years.

The deceased had been in a rather poor condition of health ever since having had an attack of pneumonia somewhat over a year ago, and it was hoped that in due course he would be fully restored to good health again.

But for a number of months past it was becoming more and more evident to his loved ones that instead of improving his condition was gradually growing worse. In spite of all that medical skill and kind friends could do, his supply of energy slowly waned until on the above mentioned date his gentle spirit winged its heavenward flight.

Besides a sorrowing widow, Mr. Compton leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father two sons and two daughters.

The deceased was thrice married. In the first family there was one daughter, namely, Mrs. Arthur Gillespie, Somerville, Mass.

In the second family were two sons and one daughter. The sons are Daniel Compton, Cambridge, Mass. and Milton Compton, Culloden and the daughter is Mrs. Benjamin Miller, Belle River.

Mr. Compton was very dear to his family and all are feeling their loss very keenly. By the third marriage there were no children.

Mr. William Compton was one of a family of nine members three brothers and six sisters.

The two brothers besides Mr. Compton now deceased were Joseph Compton and James Compton both of Brooklyn, P. E. I. and the sisters were Mrs. Henry Bramhale, Borden, P. E. I., Mrs. Malcolm Taylor, Portland, Oregon, Mrs. John Cameron, Albany, P. E. I., Mrs. Henry Compton, Iris, P. E. I., Mrs. Benjamin Bears and Mrs. George Hume both of Brooklyn, P. E. I.

All of the other members predeceased their brother William at different periods during the past thirty-five years.

The deceased was a man who was quite widely known and was held in high esteem by all. For the whole of his life he was lived on Prince Edward Island. He was born in Brooklyn, At the age of thirty years he went from here to Peter's Road where he lived for some fifteen years. From Peter's Road he moved to Belle River and after having lived there for five years he purchased a farm in Culloden where he spent the remainder of his days.

Before his final illness Mr. Compton took a deep interest in all that pertained to the welfare of the School and Community and the Church and he will be much missed in the various activities of life.

At the time of the disruption in 1925 he remained true to the Church of his fathers and he was always ready to help on with every good cause. But while he will be much missed in the outside world it is among his own loved ones that his death will be felt most keenly. His loved one will often long for his genial presence and his word of good cheer. Such longing though will be all in vain. He has gone on forever into that better home where suffering and sorrow are unknown. Knowing this none would be so unkind as to wish his unkind spirit back into bonds again.

His passing was one of deep peace. The funeral was held in the afternoon on Wednesday, Aug. 10th. In the unavoidable absence of his minister Rev. R. Healey St. J. the service was conducted by Rev. Harvey Bishop.

After a short service at the home the regular funeral service was held in the Church of Scotland Brooklyn.

The pall bearers were: Messrs. Thomas McPherson, Roderick MacKinnon, Daniel MacPherson, Earl Hume, Oliver Hume and Benjamin Miller.

Interment was in the Brooklyn Cemetery.
