BRITISH M.P. AS GYPSY.

Concludes Caravan Life Covering Twenty Years—Told Some Amusing and Instructive Experiences in That Time.

Life in a caravan, with all its freedom and its unconventionality, is dear to the heart of Harry T. Eve, K.C., the member of Parliament for Mid-Devon. George Borrow could not have entered into the spirit of such a gypsy-like existence with more zest, says an English exchange.

Mr. Eve has just concluded a caravan tour at Dartmoor, and his experiences are both amusing and instructive. He has been caravaning for over twenty years, and his present van is his fourth. During that period he has wandered over Devon, Cornwall and Somerset. A huge volume of photographic views forms a memento of his journeyings.

There is nothing ornate about his van externally. Those who meet it on the roadside or on the moors murmur "Gipsies," and pass on. The interior, too, is plain and homely, though every convenience is provided, and orderliness and cleanliness are to salient features.

It is Mr. Eve's boast that he is his own housekeeper. He does everything for himself, and the brightness of the brass work testifies to his thoroughness and energy.

When on the road his life is simple and regular. "I usually," he said yesterday, "turn in about 9 o'clock, and am out again at 5, when the pure fresh morning air is best enjoyed. I light the fire and prepare my meals, between which I can appreciate the moors to my heart's content."

"Heavy farm horses," he added, "are the best kind for the van with their steady, three miles an hour." Attired in the dress of an ordinary son of the soil, Mr. Eve often hands the reins himself and it is not an uncommon sight to see him squatting on the shafts complacently smoking, and, to all appearances, as a yokel expressed it, "like one of m' gipsies hesel, zur."

A good story is told in this connection.

A new hind had arrived, but was a stranger to the district. He proceeded to Mr. Eve's house, but was informed that the latter was "out Widdicome way picknicking." Gaining the necessary directions, he started and had not gone far before he met a caravan with an affable-looking individual in charge, whom he accosted with, "Hi, gov'nor. Seen a gentleman picknicking near Widdicome? Squire Eve, I mean—dye know him?"

The driver did. In the purest Devonshire dialect he informed his questioner that he had "come from thickey part, but hadn't zeed no purties picknicking." He rather expected the squire would be found at home and offered the wayfarer a lift "back zo far."

On the way agricultural matters were jovially discussed over pipes until, arriving near the house he sought, the stranger got down and went in. Some little time afterwards he was vastly astonished when Mr. Eve, having changed his clothes, walked into his presence and disclosed himself as the man's late companion in the van.

Mr. Eve also tells the following story with great gusto: It is his practice when journeying to stable his horses at the nearest farmhouse. He was on one occasion making the necessary arrangements with a farmer in a courtyard, when a man rushed up in a very excited state and shouted, "I say, mister, 'ave 'e got a padlock? There be some gipsies gone up the road, and us 'ave just killed a pig and us want to lock 'em up."

On another occasion Mr. Eve was forced to draw up his van nearer the high highway than usual and was soon accosted by an individual who, after laying down the law, inquired who the visitor was. "I am the Duke of —," replied Mr. Eve. "You don't look much like him," was the rejoinder. "Who are you?" asked Mr. Eve in return. "I'm the police sergeant," "Well," said Mr. Eve, "you don't look like one."
