THREE LIVES LOST IN GASOLINE EXPLOSION AT HAIFAX PIER

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 10.—Three lives lost, the schooner "Hiawatha" totally destroyed with over five hundred barrels of gasoline and oil, and the end of the Imperial Oil Company's pier at Saunderville, was the result of an explosion which occurred shortly after six o'clock this morning on board the schooner, which was lying at the pier, having practically completed loading a car of oil for Burin, Newfoundland.

SULTAN OF TURKEY LEAVES HIS PALACE

PARIS, Sept. 10.—An Athens despatch to the Petit Parisien says the Sultan of Turkey is leaving his palace at Dolma Bagtche on the Bosphorus for the reason that it is too much exposed to attacks by British submarines.

ANOTHER SLIDE IN PANAMA CANAL

PANAMA, Sept. 10.—Fifty vessels are now waiting for passage through the Panama Canal which is blocked by a new slide. 43 vessels are tied up at different points along the waterway.

LATEST BRITISH CASUALTY LIST

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Yesterday's casualties contain the names of fifty officers of whom fourteen are dead and 1,305 men of whom 304 are dead.

FINANCIERS CONSIDER EXCHANGE SITUATION

DEATHS CAUSED BY EXCESSIVE HEAT

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 10.—Excessive heat and humidity caused three deaths and a large number of prostrations here yesterday. It was the hottest September 9th since 1884, the mercury reaching a maximum of 92 degrees. The humidity was 85 per cent.

DARDANELLES EXPEDITION NEAR SUCCESS

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Lord Robert Cecil, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in a speech at Croydon last night, expressed the firm belief that the Dardanelles expedition was near a great success, which would have an enormous effect in all parts of the world.

TORONTO CHURCH DAMAGED BY LIGHTNING

TORONTO, Sept. 9.—St. Francis Roman Catholic Church, at the corner of Grace and Arthur streets, was struck by lightning this afternoon, burning the tower and causing a fire. The loss is estimated at \$10,000.

ASK FOR RECALL OF ENVOY

EXTENSION OF MUNITION INDUSTRIES

GERMANS AND AUSTRIANS GO ON STRIKE

CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—Seventy-five German and Austrian machinists employed by Torris, Wold & Co., tool manufacturers, went on strike to-day, when they learned that the company had taken a contract to make tools to be used in manufacturing shrapnel for Great Britain and her Allies.

NO INDEMNITY FOR ARABIC VICTIMS

BERLIN, Sept. 9.—In its note to the United States on the sinking of the White Star liner Arabic, the German government says that "most deeply regrets that lives were lost through the action of the commander; it particularly expresses its regret to the government of the United States on account of the death of American citizens."

SUCCESSFUL MEETING HELD IN BONSHAW

Messrs Kennedy and McNevin Show up Their Opponents' Fallacies and Predict Largely Increased Vote for Government Candidates. A Splendid Meeting.

Bonshaw hall was crowded to the door last night when the four candidates and some of their supporters delivered addresses. There was no standing-room and many had to go away disappointed. Mr John McManus presided, and maintained excellent order throughout.

Mr John S. Cousins was the first speaker and criticized the record of Mr Kennedy, complaining that he had not given the attention to the district which it was entitled to. He expressed his concurrence in the anti-union pledge and said it was not right for any one district to claim the right to run auto over the roads. The roads did not belong to any one district, but to the province as a whole.

LLOYD GEORGE ADDRESSES A VAST MULTITUDE

(Special to the Guardian.) BRISTOL, Eng., Sept. 9.—Amid uproarious applause and some confusion caused by insistent delegates demanding the right to question him Lloyd George, British Minister of Munitions addressed in a packing hall the trades and unionists here this afternoon. Striking the key note of his speech was the declaration that the war resolved itself into a conflict with the mechanics of the contending nations, "with you," said the minister, victory is assured. Without you our cause is lost.

THREE MEN KILLED, WOMAN WOUNDED

HICKMAN, Ky., Sept. 10.—Three men are dead and a woman is seriously wounded as the result of a shooting affray here last night. W. A. Naylor, formerly county judge of Fulton county, and William Collins, a miner, were shot to death and Mrs. Collins, mother of William, was shot through the arm by Claude Johnson, who in turn was shot and killed by members of a crowd of men and boys.
