Presentation of Provincial and Civic addresses to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in the Legislative Assembly Chamber, Provincial Building, Charlottetown in the forenoon of Tuesday, the 19th day of August, 1919.

Gentlemen who have received the privilege of the entree are requested to be present in the Chamber, at least fifteen minutes before the arrival of His Royal Highness.

Gentlemen desiring to be presented to His Royal Highness, will send their names and addresses to the Assistant Provincial Secretary, not later than Saturday, the 16th instant.

All attending such levee must be provided with a card with their names and addresses thereon to be handed to the officer in waiting.

Austria Fears To Face Terms

(Special to The Guardian)
VIENNA, August 12.--Dr. Karl Renner, the German Austrian Chancellor and head of the Austrian peace delegation, expressed to the Foreign Office staff today his hope that the peace terms may be somewhat softened especially with reference to southern tyrol which he said he could not believe would be lost. Commenting on the economic and financial terms of the treaty he declared they were of a nature which would plunge Austria into catastrophe.
