election in Ontario last year that
when the federal election of 1925
comes round there will be a falling
of in both the United Farmers and
Liberal representation from that
province and in the Liberal rep-
resentation from all the provinces
eastward of the Lakes. The West is
more problematical.
Outside of the Prairie Provinces
the entire Dominion is sick and
tired of the group system of par-
liamentary government. Conserv-
atives and Liberals of the more in-
telligent and thoughtful sort agree
that it is not and cannot be con-
ducive to good administration of the
country's affairs. It is not in accord
with common sense that the elec-
tors of one calling, whether farm-
ers, merchants, or manufacturers,
should bear rule. Ontario's experi-
ment under the Drur Government
ending by a Cabinet Minister being
now in a penitentiary, Mr. Forke,
the Progressive federal leader,
seems to be a man of little out-
standing ability. Still, the United
Farmer of the Prairie region may
hold together for another gen-
eral election in view of the increased
representation allotted to the West
under the Redistribution Act.

New Train Service
Effective Thursday, December
4th, new, fast and special service
will be inaugurated by the Cana-
dian Pacific Railway between Mon-
treal, Toronto and Winnipeg, both
east and west-bound on a par with
the Famous "Trans-Canada" operat-
