In Memoriam

MR. DUNCAN ROSS

The death occurred on May 14th of Mr. Duncan Ross a lifelong resident and highly respected citizen of Hunter River.

Mr. Ross had been in failing health for about six years having suffered a stroke, but was able to be around at times and work at his trade of carpenter. During the winter months he steadily grew weaker and despite medical care and tender nursing in the home he passed away on the above mentioned date.

Mr. Ross was born at Rennie's Road and was the son of Donald Ross and his wife Eliza MacDonal. He leaves to mourn besides his sorrowing widow, one daughter, Elsie, Mrs. Nellie MacLeod of Hartsville, two sons, both with the armed forces, namely Pte. Stanley of Saint John, N.B., and Sgt. John of Aldershot. Both sons willed their father shortly before his death and were also able to attend the funeral. One sister, Mrs. Chandler of Charlottetown and one brother John Ross also survive. Also several grandchildren and one great-grandchild, besides a host of relatives and friends.

Mr. Ross from early manhood followed the carpenter's trade and consequently was widely known in the surrounding country-side.

The funeral took place on Sunday, May 16th from the Presbyterian Church, Rev. Lewis Murray of the United Church officiated, assisted by Mr. Donald Nicholson who sang that lovely old hymn "Jesus Paid It All".

The service at the graveside was under the auspices of Hackett Lodge and the pall bearers were all brother Grangemen, namely, Russel Bernard, Harry Smith, O'ville Sellar, John Nicholson, William Bernard, Frank Nicholson, Mr. Ross was for several years a faithful member of Hackett Lodge. He was laid to rest in the Hunter River cemetery there to await the Resurrection Morn.
