

# Local Kinsmen Squad Retains Juvenile Title

## Overcome Three Goal Deficit To Win Series By Round Score Of 14-12

A courageous band of Charlottetown Kinsmen, fighting back from the brink of elimination Saturday night retained their Island juvenile hockey crown when they best Summerside juvenile Kinsmen squad 9-4 in an overtime battle that saw the local youngsters, entering the game with a 3-goal deficit, crash their way through with two goals in the extra session to take the series 14-12. Summerside won the opening game on home ice by an 8-5 score.

It was goals from the stick of diminutive Roy Bradley and big Willie Ross that settled the issue in favor of the defending champions after the two teams had waged one of the toughest and best-played struggles witnessed here in the history of Island juvenile hockey. The victory sent the winners into the Maritime playoffs for the second year in a row, being defeated last year in the finals by a power-packed Halifax St. Mary's crew.

It was an upset win for Bill Boyles' team, which was given little chance to overtake the snarling Summerside aggregation. It looked as if this would hold true as the visitors swarmed all over the youngsters in the first five minutes of play but couldn't break through for a goal but gradually the winners started to hit the beam form they have shown all season long.

The period was over half gone when the Charlottetown team struck for their first goal. "Red" McKenzie hammering the disc in as Biso and Larter, his linemates, drew assists. The cheering had hardly died down from that counter when Dewar Larter, displaying sensational stickhandling, raced through alone, swerved around the defence to plant a shoulder-high shot behind the Summerside goalie. It put the locals to within one goal of tying the round but they couldn't break through again in the wide-open battle.

### The Round

In the opening minutes of the second session and with the locals still pressing, Summerside's goalie committed a lapse as he stopped McKenzie from in close but a couple of minutes later the winners made it 3-0 and tied the round as Red McKenzie potted his second goal with Biso and Anderson drawing assists. The goal was the signal for Summerside to open up but it was Charlottetown who went ahead as McKenzie made the puck in as he skated across the goal mouth on Gallant's pass.

Summerside's offensive was gaining momentum as the period drew to a close; they were coming closer and closer and finally broke the ice. Denny Grady went through alone for their first goal on a smart effort and Layton Schurman, seven seconds before the period ended, got his first of three goals to make it 4-2. Schurman earned an assist.

When Summerside potted their third goal a minute and 24 seconds after the start of the third session it appeared as if it was all up with the locals. It made the score 4-3 and gave the visitors a two-goal lead on the series.

### Goals Injured

Rogers, the Summerside goalie, received a bad gash on the lip as

he went down to save and had to retire. He was replaced by Delaney and in the next couple of minutes play opened wide as both teams took the lid off. Just at the seven-minute mark Arnold McCallum got his second goal as he blazed a drive in from the left boards that found the top right hand corner. It shaved the Summerside lead to one goal and once again the round was tied as Willie Ross, one of the shining lights in the Kinsmen cause, pokechecked the disc away from a lone Summerside defender to notch the equalizer. Play raced from end to end for the next few minutes as the youngsters fought it out. There were but 48 seconds to go when Ross again stepped into the picture backhanding a sliding puck into the cage as players milled in front of the Summerside cage. It looked like the winner but the Summerside team, game as they come, evened it up in the last twelve seconds. Layton Schurman picking a corner of Grady's pass up from the blue line as the winners tried desperately to clear.

In the first few seconds of the overtime Biso was chased for holding and Red McKenzie had a misconduct tacked on him when he disputed, too strongly, the referee's decision. It looked bad for the locals but like a bolt out of the blue came what was the winning tally. Holding desperately, Roy Bradley fired a loping shot from the red line that went right into the cage as the Summerside goalie failed to see the shot in time. That was the payoff. At 5:40 Ross and McCallum teamed up for another to end the scoring and series as a stout defensive system held the losers at bay in the last four minutes of play.

HALIFAX, March 7.—St. Francis Xavier University kept pace with Acadia Saturday when they defeated Dalhousie Tigers 7-5 to hold a first-place tie with Wolfville, N.S., group in the Nova Scotia intercollegiate hockey race.

The game was tied 4-4 at the end of regular play. Dalhousie protested the game. They said Xaverians' goal judge was a member of the team and tried to signal a goal on a shot by Willie Robertson which Dalhousie said went through the back of the net.

Now it will be a matter of the locals meeting the New Brunswick champions. They may well be that for, with the exception of one player, Coach Charlie Hogan will have a full squad to whip into shape.

The title swayed in the balance several times during Saturday's game. When the locals raced into a 4-0 lead to take the series lead it looked as if Summerside had shot their bolt but the western youngsters rallied to make it 4-4 and still have two goals to work on. Loss of their goals at that stage didn't do the visitors any good but then again they received a main leading the series, they scored the equalizer 12 seconds before the end of regulation time.

Again the pendulum seemed to sway in favor of the westerners just after the overtime got underway when the winners drew a penalty and the lost a player for misconduct; it was here the winners showed their real spirit. They got one goal of the gift variety but then added another one for good measure that was earned all the way, winding up their star-studded performance by holding their hard-pressing opponents at bay in the last four minutes of the encounter.

The game wrote another chapter into the ever-brightening story of Island juvenile hockey. It was a privilege to watch two smart teams of youngsters battle it out in the hard but clean manner in which they played on Saturday night; they played the game all the way and strictly on their merits and now that the local squad have again come through they are deserving of all the support the fans can give them when they go out seeking Maritime honors.

Although beaten in their home game Saturday night, Saint Dunstan's University basketball team are still very much in the running for the N. B.-P. E. I. Intercollegiate basketball crown. They gave the visiting Mt. Allison team just about all they could handle in the game on Saturday night at Prince of Wales Auditorium and according to fans who watched the game have an even chance of coping the title in the game at Sackville some time this week.

But whether they do or not Saints proved by their performance Saturday night that they are well qualified representatives of the league. To some it was thought they would be outclassed; that was far from the case. Showing traces of nervousness in the first half, particularly when in scoring position, the local University team came back to match their opponents point for point in the wind-up session and inter-4 is bound to be high in the outcome of the second game.

The full week-end of sport just concluded produced some of the best competition of the entire season. On top of the basketball and hockey the Victoria Driving Club's Saturday afternoon meeting produced the fastest times of the season and what men described as the keenest race.

## Romeo Paces Fastest Heat Of The Season

Facing the first two heats under 30 seconds and coming back to win the third in 30 2-5 seconds Romeo, owned by Will McNeill and driven by veteran "Jiggs" Arling, Saturday afternoon chalked up the fastest times of the Victoria Driving Club's ice racing season as he won a straight heat victory over Royal Jim and Bright Spot in the Class A Pace of five-class card. Romeo's performance were some of the many good ones that were witnessed all afternoon.

Racing was probably the closest and keenest of the entire season with horses racing two and three abreast right from the word "go" in every heat and coming under the wire only inches apart in a great many instances as Lusticia, again driven capably by Austin Tierney won the Class A. Trot. Johnny Kalmuck came through to win Class B. Pace, Buddy Budlong headed the summary in Class C Pace and Little Millie, daughter of that grand old campaigner Millie Kalmuck, won a four-heat battle from six other horses in the Class D. Pace, final event on the card.

Eight of the fifteen heats were raced in better than thirty-one seconds over a very fast track, with Lusticia and Billy Kalmuck, the two entrants in the Class A. Trot, both going quarters in thirty seconds, just 2-5 of a second slower than Romeo's great 29 2-5 seconds effort.

The races were again run off quickly and efficiently by the capable officials in charge, with Starter Russel Abbott, as is his wont getting his fields away with a minimum of scoring and in good order.

## Saint John Wins 7-2 From Moncton

MONCTON, N. B., March 7.—A desperate band of hard-fighting Saint John Beavers found two gaping holes in Moncton Hawks' defensive system Saturday night and raced through for seven goals and a much-needed 7-2 victory in the Maritime Senior Hockey League finals.

Beavers' win gave them two victories in the best-of-seven series compared with three for Hawks. If Beavers win on their home ice Monday night the series would be deadlocked and the stage set for the deciding game at Moncton Wednesday night.

Loss of star defenceman Call Bastarache, out with a knee injury that will keep him on the sidelines for at least two weeks, was a crushing blow to Hawks' hopes of winning last night's tilt. Beavers had little difficulty penetrating the Hawks rearguard and when they did they found Hughie MacDonald playing his weakest game of the series in the Moncton goal.

It was a hard defeat for the losers but a smashing victory for the rejuvenated Beavers who went down to a 6-0 defeat in their last appearance on Moncton ice. Last night's edition of Coach Jackie Keating's port city squad was a far cry from the disorganized band of pucksters that proved an easy mark for Hawks in earlier games. Beavers never looked better. They skated fast, kept Hawks tied up and received inspiration from sensational net-minding by Sonny MacDonald.
