Confession in The Clements' Murder Case

(Special to The Guardian.) BOSTON, Oct. 6.—Halle Mobroy, aged 18, has confessed a hand in the murder of Frederick A. Clements, the Charlottetown victim of an atrocious murder at Burlington, Mass.

Mobroy said that two unknown men killed Clements and he, under threat of death, helped tie up the body, carry it to the swimming pool, put weights on it, and throw it in the water.

The confession came a murder in Burlington thirty years ago in which one of the participants went free by turning State's evidence.

The Clements murder mystery became a sensation today when at Beverly, 20 miles east of Burlington, the body of another murder victim was found in a pond, killed, apparently as the Charlottetown victim had been killed. Both bodies were weighted down by auto parts and thrown in the water.

Clements was murdered for money, less than \$100, and the police think the two men, who Mobroy says killed him, may have quarrelled over the money, and have gone to Beverly, and one killed the other.

A Guardian representative went to Beverly today and to the tomb where the body of the second victim lies. So far there is not the slightest clue to identification.

The victim did not live near the place where the body was found, as there are no missing persons from that section.

Mobroy will be formally charged with the murder of the Charlottetown man today. He worked in his garage at Burlington.

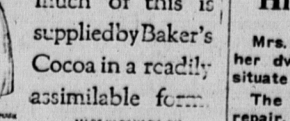

THAT CAR OF YOURS

THE CARE OF YOUR CAR

Now is a good time to use a little thinner oil in your motor, also, if you have been using grease as the differential, to remove it and replace it with oil (50W-W.)

Attend to the under gear of the car by washing it thoroughly and having it painted with a good grade of iron paint to protect it from the inclement conditions that will prevail shortly.

After washing and before painting of undergear, there is one point of vital importance—to be sure that every moving part under the body is thoroughly lubricated. Do this two or three times within 24 hours to make sure that every part gets lubrication.

Adjust the brakes, front wheels, steering; put in any bushing that are necessary and be positive to replace every cotter key; tighten all nuts and bolts and then apply the paint.

Now is a good time, if the car will be working hard during the Fall and Winter to remove the tires and paint the rim with graphite—just a small amount. Replace the tires and inflate to their proper capacity.

Question.—What is the best way to store a battery in the winter—dry or wet?

A. C. A. Miscouche. Answer.—Dry storage is of course preferable, as it is possible then, to have a knowledge as to the state of the battery and whether it is really worth storing for to give service the next year, but in the case of a nearly new battery it is better to store it wet. If the battery has given any abnormal trouble during the season, it is better to store it dry. Any battery over a year old, should be dry stored.

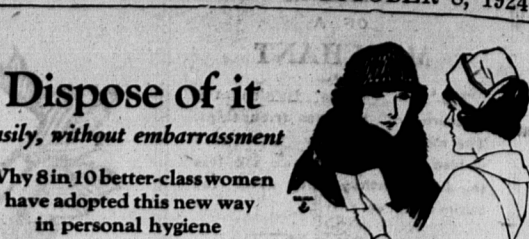
