SATURDAY evening about half past eleven a young man falling to gain entrance to the saloon on Queen Street kept by Walter Josey put his fist through the glass. Then with blood streaming from his hand he entered the Chinamen's store but was summarily ejected by the police.

THURSDAY's football game between Abegweit's and St. Dunstan's promises to be the most interesting game ever played in Charlottetown. Last season these teams played three draws; this season neither has been scored against; each is determined to win and the result of Thursday's game will be awaited with interest.

FARMERS are complaining of the bad prospects of the potato crop, and say that the yield will fall short of the calculations made early in the season. In many districts there is scarcely a potato patch that has escaped the dry rot. The crop will be greatly reduced from this cause, and as the same complaint comes from many other parts of the Province and P. E. Island, exceptionally high prices for tubers are looked for this autumn.—North Sydney Herald.

CHARLES P. Stowe, who is a brother of Mrs. John A. Woodside of Kensington, and his daughter Miss Ethel, have recently paid a short visit to the Island after an absence of over twenty years. They were delighted not only with the Island and its beauties, but with the kind and hospitable manner in which they were received and entertained by their relatives and their friends. The only regret they felt was the forced shortness of their visit, Mr. Stowe being obliged to return to Boston, Mass. three days after his arrival and his daughter a week later.

The firemen were called out about a quarter to seven yesterday morning to a blaze in the bakery of John Murphy, Kent Street in the rear of Worth's Livery stables. When the firemen arrived the building was apparently doomed but with four streams of water the flames were held back and finally extinguished. The building, which is an old one and the scene of two previous fires was badly gutted. The fire which probably caught from the oven apparently had been smouldering all night as the smell of burning wood was detected at the livery stable about ten o'clock Saturday night. Search could not reveal any danger, however. After the work of the firemen was over they were entertained to hot coffee, etc., by Mr. Murphy. At one time the livery stable adjoining was threatened and all the horses and carriages were removed.
