Miss Annie MacEachern, was elected president of the Young People's Society of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Montague at the annual meeting on Wednesday, December 31st, at the home of Mrs. N. D. Nicholson. Miss Thelma Larter was also re-elected secretary-treasurer.

What might have been a serious accident when the flat roof covering the old section of the Montague garage fell in upon a car directly below. The heavy weight of the snow on the roof, caused by the recent heavy snowfall, strained the girders beyond their capacity, with the result that the back end of the car fell in, taking down with it quite a large section of the garage under the ownership of Messrs. Claude and George Nicholson, was formerly owned by Mr. N. D. Nicholson. At present work is underway clearing the roof and debris, so that construction of a new roof may be begun. These enterprising young men have already erected a new workshop at the rear of the garage, giving ample space for car washing and lubrication. To them goes the honor of installing the first hydraulic car lift in Montague, which is of great convenience to motorists who wish a quick and thorough job. There has also been installed a modern portable electric arc-welder, which is of such a benefit to farmers in particular, and to motorists in general, completing a job in a minimum of time with the greatest efficiency. Such enterprise is to be commended on the part of these young men who are ever ready to use modern scientific machinery in the garage.

The working of clearing away the snow on the main street is still continuing although the hard packed snow is now offering considerable difficulty. Poole and Beady's Bulldozer, operated by Mr. Paddy Lucas, is being used to clear the snow from the curb so as to widen the street to permit the passage of three cars. Mr. Lucas has cleared the street near the school running parallel with the main street, and also many other side streets, which now permits the passage of traffic practically to all sections of the town. At the same time work is still being continued to clear the railroad yards to permit easier transference of goods to and from the railway cars. Countless tons of snow from the yards have been dumped over the big by trucks hired for the purpose. The road situation has improved considerably with the main road to Charlottetown, Georgetown, and Murray River open for traffic. However, the road to Lower Montague is still under snow for a long portion of the way necessitating plow work soon, although there has been a heavy snow fall, the snow in front, and the river is still open above the bridge, a section which is usually one of the first to freeze over. The Georgetown Ferry is still making its scheduled runs to Lower Montague, there being no sign of ice as yet in the Georgetown Harbour.

The lovely floral remembrances bore silent tribute to the esteem in which the deceased was held, as well as bringing much comfort to those bereaved by her passing.

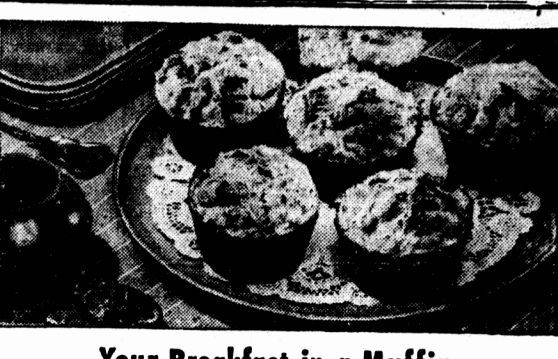
