IN MEMORIAM

His sickness was patiently borne and for his future life in the great eternity he trusted only in the atoning blood of Jesus Christ. One of the kindest neighbors, his home was often visited by old and young, and he will be greatly missed in the community and in the church where he was a regular attendant until sickness prevented him from being present. The funeral services in the house and at the grave were performed by the Rev. D. MacLean, and Messrs. Nell MacBachern, George Wilson, Nell J. MacNeill, Hugh Mac-Three, A. Doull and Theo. Stewart acted as pall-bearers. Although it was a busy season the funeral was very largely attended. He leaves behind to mourn their loss a widow and one son, Colin. Absent but not forgotten. CASSANDRA STRUCK AN ICEBERG. ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 26.—The Donaldson Liner Cassandra, which struck an iceberg 160 miles off Cape Race, arrived here tonight. Her forecast was stove in by a low-lying berg. The 400 passengers aboard are well. The Cassandra sailed from Montreal last Wednesday for Glasgow. She is a vessel of 8,130 gross tons, with a length of 455 feet, and was built in Greenock, Scotland, by the S. B. and E. Scott Company, Limited, in 1906.
