—Messrs Frank Gavin and Harold McCarthy, Sea Cow Pond, have returned recently from Lewiston, Me.—Y.

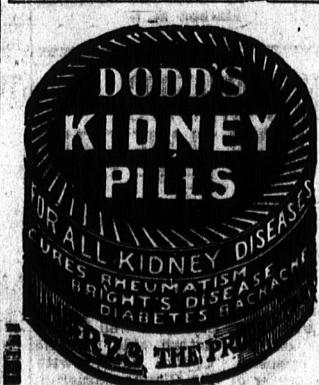
—Mr. George McDuff, Alf. McDonald and Eddie Gaudet, Waterford have returned from the West looking none the worse of their adventure.—Y.
