Her sincere desire being to assist in all good work, on coming here. She at once took an active part in all church work. Sister Ross frequently led the services and on several occasions addressed the congregation from the platform. She was an easy and pleasing speaker and never failed to charm by the elegance of her diction. The writer had the pleasure as well as the profit of listening to her instructive addresses and moving appeals on more than one occasion. We shall not soon forget her love-stirring discourse from I. John v. 14, 15. What a meeting we had! The good seed of the kingdom was sown and the power and presence of the Holy Spirit was manifest. Results proved it to be a glorious service but eternity alone will unfold what a season of grace it was to many. While delighting the audience as a speaker, Sister Ross especially excelled when petitioning the throne of grace. Her prayer was simple, direct, tasteful—it was all prayer. We shall hear her no more on earth. Only a few Sabbath's ago she attended divine service for the last time and was speaker for the evening. Those who heard her on that occasion little thought it would be the last time they would have the opportunity of doing so. Her work is done and now comes rest. She will be missed from our circle her presence seemed to be so much needed. To the bereaved parents and friends in a distant land, as well as to those present, we extend our deepest sympathy and sincerely commend them to the God of all comfort.
