THE MARKETS.—There was a fair attendance at the Charlottetown market yesterday and quite a number of people from the rural districts were in the city. Pumpkins sold at from 25 to 50 cents each, plums at 10 cents per quart and tomatoes at 10c. per quart. Fresh mackerel were plentiful from 15 to 25 cents. Feedstuffs were dull with practically nothing doing, while prices in all other cases remained the same as on the previous market-day.

FIRE AT HOPE RIVER.—The dwelling house of Mr. Moses Walsh of Hope River was burned to the ground about noon on Sunday last. The family with the exception of one daughter, were absent at Church when the fire broke out. The roof is supposed to have caught from sparks from the fire, but the fire was not noticed until it had made too much headway for anything to be done. The neighbours did all in their power to save the building, but all was lost except some of the furniture in the lower part of the house.—E

BECKER'S APPEAL MAY BE HEARD OCT. 13.

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 29.—The appeal of former Police Lieutenant Charles Becker, of New York, and the four gunmen from the sentence of death for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, will be argued before the Court of Appeals on October, 13 provided the impeachment trial of Governor Sultzer is concluded by that date. Announcement to this effect was made when the Court of Appeal reconvened to-day after the summer recess.

SEVENTY THIRTEEN MEN BEAT IN HEROIC HAND TO HAND FIGHT

TEHERAN, Sept. 29.—About one hundred Marauding Lur tribesmen, who were on a cattle raid near Sultabad, were surprised by the gendarmes, under the command of the Swedish Major Skjoldelbran, in fierce hand to hand fight followed, in which seventy of the tribesmen were killed and thirty three taken prisoners. The gendarmes lost three killed and two severely wounded.

MR. REDMOND'S SPEECH AT CAIROIVEEN.

NEW YORK, September 29.—A cable to the Tribune from London this morning says:—John E. Redmond, by his speech at Cairoiveen, Kerry, yesterday, virtually killed all prospects of a settlement to the home rule crisis by consent. The Irish Nationalist leader's speech was his first pronouncement since the publication of Earl Lorneburn's letter suggesting a conference, and for that reason was awaited with no little anxiety by his followers.

The moderation of his speeches in parliament has on occasion, been a source of criticism among the straiter sect of Nationalists, who may well have anticipated that their leader would offer at least a small olive branch on the Lorneburn altar. All such fears or hopes, as the case may be, are falsified by the speech at Cairoiveen. It is in Mr. Redmond's younger vein and in fact a re-statement with every emphasis of the nationalist position. Home rule, said Mr. Redmond, was now within sight, and certain of fruition whatever Ulster might do. He gave his constituents in the cabinet in words blunt as a bludgeon—"The orders are, full steam ahead with home rule."

MAINE FIGURES OF LUMBER CUT

BANGOR, Me., Sept. 29.—From figures compiled by a representative of one of the large timberland interests in northern Maine the lumber cut on the St. John, Arrostook, and Fish river waters, will be considerably smaller than usual. According to the present indications the total cut in Maine on waters tributary to the St. John river and on the main St. John will not be far in excess of 60,000,000 feet.

This condition is due largely to the fact that there was a great many fires on the mills and in the woods. The Portage Lake Mill Co., will not cut nearly as much this year, as the mill at Portage was destroyed by fire in the spring, and all the logs which would have been manufactured this season are on hand. This company has erected a new and larger mill on the site of the old, with modern equipment, and will be ready to commence operations by Oct. 15.

The Stetson Cutter Co., of St. John will have about the usual amount of Maine logs to go down the river with the drives in the spring, and it seems to be the mills on the side of the boundary that are curtailing their cuts.

BIDDLE, MOST MUSCULAR MAN OF MILLIONS IS 39 TO-DAY.

Philadelphia's muscular millionaire, Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, author, explorer, lecturer, Sunday school teacher, boxer and all-round athlete, was born in the Quaker City thirty-nine years ago to-day. Although he inherited a large fortune, he was not obsessed by his wealth. In his youth he acquired a Heidelberg education, explored the Madagascars and other out-of-the-way corners of the world, and worked for two years as a reporter on a Philadelphia paper. He revised the Philadelphia Sunday Graphic, founded a "society" weekly, and started a publishing house, with offices in New York, Philadelphia, and San Francisco. In his leisure he wrote books, travelled, taught Sunday school classes, engaged in religious propaganda, organized a "gentleman's boxing club," and fought exhibition boxing bouts with Bob Fitzsimmons, "Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien, and other professionals. His literary productions show considerable ability, keen observation, vivid imagination and much versatility, and include "All Round Athletics," "The Froggy Fairy Book," "The Madeira Islands," and "The Land of the Royal Geographical Society and other learned bodies of England and America."

David Rowland Francis, who has been Secretary of the Interior in Cleveland's cabinet, governor of Missouri, mayor of St. Louis, President of St. Louis world's fair, and a globe-trotting diplomat, who has had medals pinned on his breast by nearly all of the monarchs of Europe and Asia, was born in Kentucky sixty-three years ago to-day.

PEDLARS PAID THUGS TO BEAT O'CONNOR; KILLED BRADY INSTEAD.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Two pedlars offered Frank Van Tonio, a Brooklyn gunman, \$50 to beat up David O'Connor, who took their horse by the bridle and amused himself by leading the animal around in circles. Van Tonio accepted and yesterday he was held for the grand jury on a charge of murder. Witnesses testified that he mistook Robert Brady for O'Connor and shot him dead. The pedlars, Max and William Klein, brothers, confessed the bargain with the gunman, but protested that they had no grievance against Brady and no desire to get against anything worse than a beating. They were held as material witnesses.
