The defense declares it is possible that this man was perfectly innocent and that he did not know that the material there was intoxicating liquor, subject to duty. He says that three strangers came up from the shore and bargained with him for storage space for goods. They said their boat had broken down and they wanted to rent a barn and afterwards took a part of the shed and paid him \$25, and he did not know the goods were intoxicating liquor. He gave consent to storage these goods without any knowledge and without asking what it was. Can you accept that story? What place did these men come from? What became of the damaged boat? How were the goods brought across the land to the barn? All is mystery.

The three men disappeared and have never been seen again. The bargain was the goods were to be left there a few days. They seem to have been covered with some straw, but when the accused did his threshing, he put new straw to the depth of several feet on the straw already covering the liquor. He ought to know quite soon after the transaction that it was rum. He says he never told his wife about the rum because he wanted to keep her out of it. Why should he be so anxious to keep this matter from his wife, if it was an honorable matter? From this man's conduct, both by word and deed, you gather your convictions. You have heard the evidence, if you come to the conclusion that the goods were dutiable and were harbored, kept or concealed the crown has discharged its burden of proof. The prisoner must receive the benefit of reasonable doubt.

The jury after being out for some

time disagreed, eight acquittal and four for conviction—and were discharged. The prisoner was admitted to bail on the condition that he appear when called upon.

The next case taken up was The King versus John Grady, charged with the theft of a gasoline motor boat engine. Only two witnesses, Napoleon Arseneault, owner of the engine, and Hubert McDonald had given evidence when the court rose shortly after 5 p. m. The case will be continued on the resumption of the court at 11 o'clock this morning.

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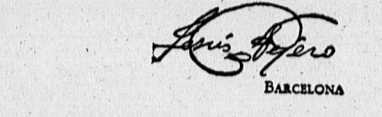

Pension Fund Problem Left For Conference

OTTAWA, June 13.—Besides the appointment of the standing committees for the year this morning's session was occupied with the further consideration of the report of the pension board. As a result of the decision taken the whole question of contributions to the pension fund has been referred to a conference of the administration with the pension board to report at the next assembly. In the meantime the existing regulations are to be continued.

MAKES PROTEST

OTTAWA, June 13.—A protest by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative Leader, against an appropriation of \$120,000 for salaries and expenses of the advisory board on tariff and taxation, featured discussion of miscellaneous estimates in the House of Commons this morning. Mr. Bennett referred to the tariff board as a "glorified commission for enabling the Minister of Finance to escape responsibility."
