Cream, Milk Collection To Be Discussed

The best possible plan to give the maximum benefit to Canada's war effort will be discussed today by representatives of about 25 creameries in this province when they meet today with Mr. A. L. Norman, Services representative for the Maritimes, Halifax. Methods of eliminating duplications of routes by trucks and the number of milk and cream collections to be made weekly will be the main topics dealt with.

Statement On Cost Under New Taxes

The new taxes announced by Hon. J. L. Ilsley, Finance Minister, Tuesday, will mean a few extra cents on certain goods and services to the consumer according to an order received by the War-time Prices and Trade Board yesterday. It is pointed out that the retailer does not benefit financially from this increase in their prices.

Mr. Norman explained last night that there was much duplication and over-lapping in the collection of milk and cream. The War-time Prices and Trade Board are anxiously co-operating with the creameries to co-operate by revising their schedules so as to allocate the collection routes between trucks. This is being requested with the view of conserving tires, gasoline and equipment. Where there are now six trucks hauling, he feels that possibly three or four could do the same work.

The services representative asserted that the truckmen have been unable to get together and devise ways and means to prevent this over-lapping. This was mostly due to the fact that there were no binding regulations. Now they are being asked to zone their territories and work out some plan which would be satisfactory to all. The administrator of services would issue an order making it mandatory. The Board was not being dictatorial, he declared, and is aware that the haulers realize this is much waste and unnecessary duplication in their own industry.

Regarding the number of collections to be made, Mr. Norman said this matter could be worked out by the creamery representatives. A suggestion had been advanced that only two collections should be made every three weeks but farmers would not be held to this. He thought that the usual program of two collections each week would be continued during the hot summer months and the number for the remaining months would be worked out.

Following statement authorized tonight quote taxes on goods and services announced Mr. Ilsley's Budget Tuesday night will be allowed to be added to maximum prices charged by sellers of such goods and services. The intention of such taxes is that directly or indirectly they shall be paid by the consumer and a board order will be issued on Wednesday to enable this to be done. Manufacturers and merchants are advised that they will not be allowed to pass on any greater sum than the exact amount of the tax. When a manufacturer pays the tax and increases his price by the amount the wholesaler and retailer will be allowed to increase the selling price by the same amount but will not be allowed to take any profit of markup on the new tax or on the increase in the old tax as the case may be. No increase in price will be permitted except on goods or services on which the new or increased tax has actually been paid.
