CRIPPLED SOLDIER PRAISES S. A. HUTS

Received Nothing but Kindness From the Officers who Served in France.

A strong letter of endorsement of the Salvation Army's work at the front was written by a patient in the Davisville (Toronto) Military Hospital to the Red Shield Drive Committee. The man lost one of his limbs, but was fortunate enough to get back to his own country. His letter is in part as follows:—

"I would like to express my thanks for the good I have received at the hands of the Salvation Army Captains and Staff attached to some of the huts overseas. I have always found them generous and more than willing to help the soldiers, and in this way make the boys feel at home and comfortable.

"When on duty and serving my time with the 3rd Canadian Training Depot in England, I had the pleasure of visiting the Salvation Army Huts at West Sandling, and would spend many hours there. I have had many meals there and found them as good as any that I could get at home in Canada. The price charged was only 25c, or one shilling. The meal usually consisted of good ham and eggs, potatoes, bread and butter, and an excellent cup of coffee. Right here I will state that it was impossible to get the same kind of meal anywhere else for less than 40c. This was in 1916. I was also given a hearty send-off by the members of the staff attached to this hut, when leaving for France. Also received a few little things, such as memo, book and pencils, from them, which came in very useful later on when I was in France.

"Another thing I will mention is that I was never turned away from the huts hungry if I did not have the money to pay for the food, but they always allowed me to pay up later on when I did have the money. This fact made the boys feel at home, even though they were thousands of miles away from their Canadian homes. I feel that I owe this to the Salvation Army in letting them know the good they are doing for the boys overseas but will ask you not to publish my name and number."

—LANE'S TRIBUTE TO THE DOMINION
NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, was the principal speaker at the annual dinner of the Canadian Club. It was the organization's first banquet since 1913, because of the war.

Mr. Lane who was born on Prince Edward Island, said that no man, no matter from what country he came, could feel prouder than the citizens of the Dominion that sent 500,000 men overseas to fight the battles of freedom.

America, he said, had given a challenge to Europe, saving to its people: "There is something you do not have which we enjoy—you are not free. Come forth and be loyal to yourselves. Set up governments you can rely on."

"The conference taking place in Europe now," he added, "has a purpose—the banding of the nations together in a unity of purpose and league of nations that will prevent the countries of Europe becoming the slaughter-house in the future that they have been in the past."

Mr. Lane was followed by Hon. Martin Burrill, Secretary of State of Canada and Minister of Mines. Mr. Burrill said he had been in Washington when the United States was a neutral, and found it a hotbed of German intrigue and propaganda, with a gentleman named Bernstorff working overtime, but whose hopes he thanked God, had been blasted. Mr. Burrill said Canadians rejoiced when the United States entered the war and became their brothers in arms, and that the Canadians appreciated the moral support and military achievements of the Americans.

He paid tribute to the memory of Colonel Roosevelt, which brought the audience to its feet amid great applause.

Now that the war is over, Mr. Burrill continued, it is a time for gratitude and optimism. He ridiculed the talk of some persons about the decadence of England and her navy, and asserted it was a great moral force that kept England and her dominions together.

—MISRULE TALE OF RUBBISH
In contradiction of charges that England misruled her colonies or some of them, he pointed out that India had contributed 1,250,000 of her "dusky sons" to fight for the Mother Country, and that all of the colonies did equally well. He added that they all believed freedom was not only worth living for, but dying for. Mr. Burrill said though democracy has stood the test of a cruel war, it has a hard task ahead for the next few months.

The millennium was not here, but he was hopeful that there will be a fundamental agreement between the nations, and that the United States will have a great share in the settlement. The Germans were not fit to possess colonies. They have not even now shown any signs of repentance and should be made to pay to the uttermost farthing for what they have made others suffer. He asserted the Germans had applauded the acts of their rulers during the war, and if they had won, the German public would still be cheering them. He thought it would be a good idea for the Allies to put an army of occupation in Berlin.

Governor Edge of New Jersey, spoke of the responsibilities of the reconstruction period and the splendid work of Jersey during the war. Other speakers were Sir James A. M. Aikins, Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, and the Rev. Charles A. Eaton.
