**SUDDEN DEATH OF SHERBROOKE LADY RESIDENT**

Mrs. George D. MacKinnon Passed Away Last Evening After Only Ten Minutes Illness—Her Passing Came as Great Shock to Family and Friends.

The Sherbrooke Daily Record of Nov. 5th, says:

A gloom of sorrow has been cast over the city by the sudden passing away last evening, of Mrs. G. D. MacKinnon, a well known and highly esteemed resident, whose death occurred suddenly at seven-thirty o'clock at her home on Portland avenue.

Mrs. MacKinnon had been in her usual health, and during the day had been happy in the visit of her three daughters who are attending school in Montreal. The Misses MacKinnon had come home for the week-end in honor of the arrival of a new baby in the family, born to Mr. and Mrs. Stewart MacDonald, (Grace MacKinnon) on Friday last.

Mr. MacKinnon had left with his daughters for Montreal at five o'clock, and received the sad news while on the train carrying him toward Montreal.

Just before her passing away Mrs. MacKinnon had held her little grandson in her arms, and the end came without warning, after only ten minutes' suffering from severe hemorrhage.

The deceased lady was born at Lacolle, Que., daughter of Mr. Joseph Charles Bowman. She is survived by her husband, Mr. Geo. D. MacKinnon, four daughters, Grace (Mrs. Stewart MacDonald) and the Misses Josephine, Jean and Eleanor MacKinnon; two little grandchildren, two brothers and five sisters, all of whom have the deepest sympathy of the community in their great bereavement.

The funeral service will be held tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock at the family residence.

**THE QUEEN VICTORIA OF INDIA**

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, England, Nov. 6.—The Begum of Bhopal, now on a visit to England with her son the Nawab, has been called the Queen Victoria of India. She is 70 years old and had been the ruler of Bhopal for 25 years when she abdicated in 1926 in favor of her son.

The Begum is a frequent visitor to this country and takes great interest in Western civilization though she always remains closely veiled when she appears in public. When she secured recognition for her son from British Government and the Government of India and yielded up the throne to him, she gave the whole of her property, over \$50,000,000, for the propagation of Islam throughout India and decided to devote the remainder of her life to that cause. Her enlightened rule of Bhopal made it one of the most progressive provinces in India.

**NEW BRITISH OUTNUMBERED BY OTHER RACES**

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—Manitoba received the largest influx of population during the past six months, according to a return by the Department of Immigration, when of 123,713 persons, 49,975 proceeded to the Middle-West Province. Ontario came second with 30,677.

9,202 GERMANS.

Of British settlers there were 44,876.

Preferred European countries sent 20,667 people. Germany furnishing the largest percentage, 9,202 settlers; Denmark next, 2,482, with Finland and Sweden also among the two thousands.

Of non-preferred, Ruthenians provided the largest number, 13,522; Poles, 7,060; Magyars, 4,469; Slovaks, 3,705; Jugo-Slavs, 2,594, and Jews, 1,584. The rest of the world tapered to one lone Persian.

From the United States came 18,707 persons, 9,452 men, 4,387 women, and 4,868 children under eighteen.

The parade will move off at 10.20 headed by the Legion Band and will arrive at the monument in time to begin the service at 10.40.

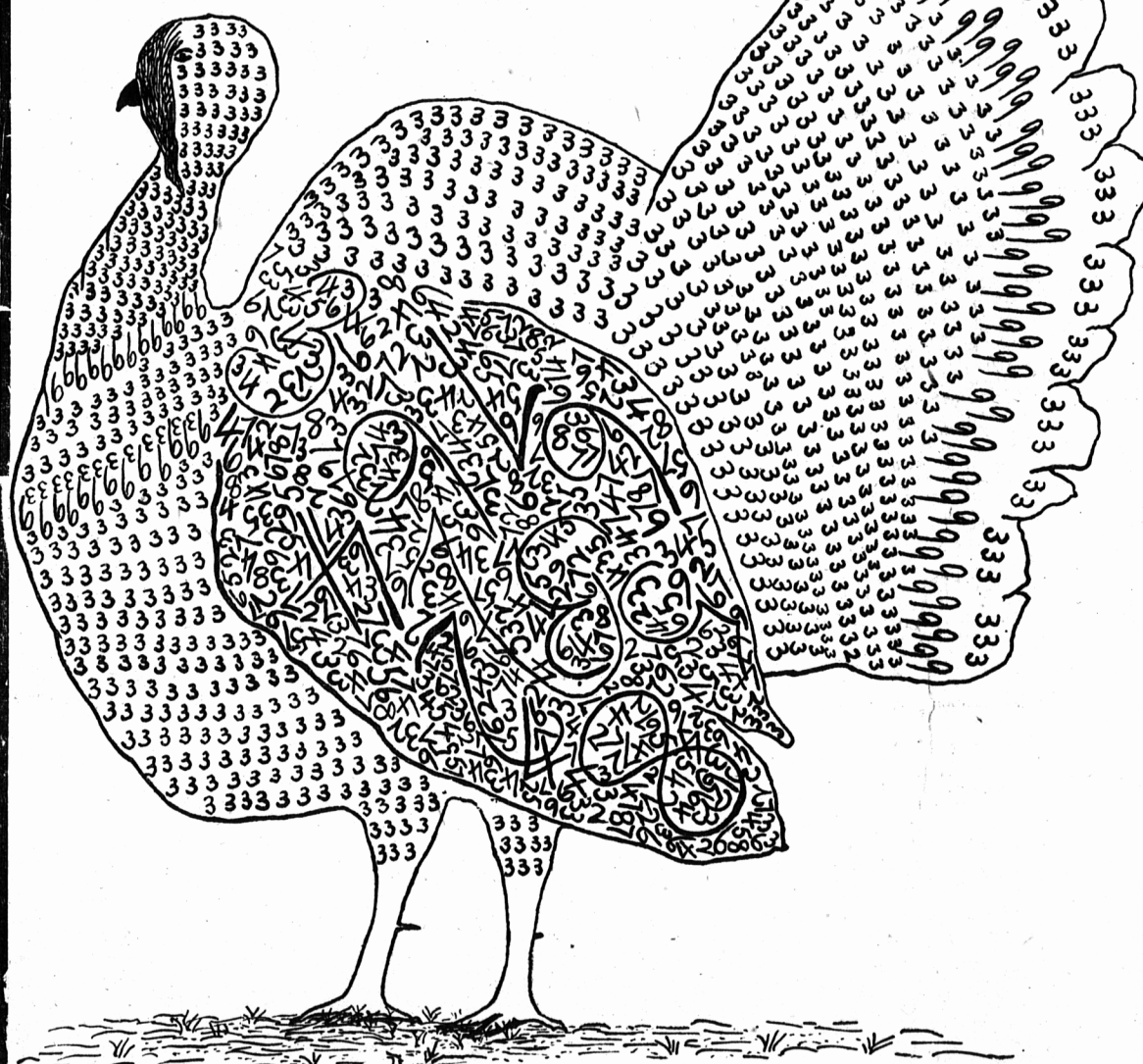
